Make sure when you light a really good fire you have with you plenty of gum leaves to throw onto the flames. Then you will see clouds of smoke billowing out everywhere before eventually the sparks come alive and fly out and create new fires all over the place. The cleansing smoke from the fire our First Nations People lit covered all of us as we met together in our Sacred Place for Truth Telling. There is real importance in our Sacred Place. We initially gathered, from all across Australia, in the St Mary of the Cross, Mackillop Chapel in Sydney. Mary MacKillop and our First Nations People knew each other and worked together really well. There was plenty of Truth Telling.

We were called into something special, something new. Mary understood, only too well, the importance of Sacred Place and Story-Telling together. Mary also understood her vocation was the Truth Telling of Jesus Christ by living it as a real witness. The Church will only renew when there is Truth Telling and living the understandings together.

It was in humility we listened to the Truth Telling and we prayed deeply, in the sacredness of our hearts, that we would hear and live the call of the Holy Spirit. Each morning our First Nations People threw a few more gum leaves onto the flames and the cloud of cleansing smoke billowed again before the sparks flew everywhere creating new fires in our hearts and minds.

St John Paul II told us that all our efforts "will be totally inadequate" unless Christ increases in our hearts and minds. And so we listened. We listened to our vocation to be in communion with our God and all

the witnesses of Christ who have gone before us. What a Missionary Team!

Pope Francis, the prophet in our time says, "I dream of a 'missionary option', that is, a missionary impulse capable of transforming everything so that the Church's customs, ways of doing things, times and schedules, language and structures can be suitably channelled for the evangelisation of today's world rather than for her self-preservation." (Evangelii Guadium 2013).

You should have seen the fireworks on Wednesday when the topic was Witnessing to the Equal Dignity of Women and Men. Someone threw some extra gum leaves on the fire. Clouds of smoke billowed everywhere. The sparks came alive and the flames were bigger than ever. It became obvious to everyone that the Holy Spirit wanted a really, lively, fiery experience and not to be treated like some good idea to be placed on a shelf.

There is so much to do. We first of all must pray and commit ourselves to Christ as true witnesses. What is God asking our Church in Australia today? What are our gifts and frailties that the Holy Spirit can set on fire?

Hopefully, over the next few weeks, I can offer my understandings of the eight themes focused on throughout the Plenary Council. These themes can be found on the Plenary Council website: plenarycouncil.catholic.org.au

The first theme will be Part 1. Reconciliation: Healing Wounds, Receiving Gifts. Until then:

Come Holy Spirit, Fill the hearts of the Faithful, and kindle in them the Fire of your Love. Send forth Your Spirit and they shall be created and you shall Renew the face of the Earth.

THE PLENARY COUNCIL

Monday: Reconciliation: Healing Wounds, Receiving Gifts

Part 1

Every morning we began with the Welcome to Country and the cleansing ceremony followed by our prayers and song. These events were deeply moving and meaningful. Our indigenous brothers and sisters were open for us to receive the Truth-Telling. The Story telling was confronting and challenging. Could we dream that we would truly listen and walk together in humility, understanding, hope and compassion? That our new song-lines would be sung together in rich harmony and love?

We were told accounts of how the aboriginal girls would have a stint inserted in their arm for the purpose of contraception to stop them breeding. The men would check the arms of the girls and if they saw the stint they knew the girls were good to be raped and abused. Today we have the accounts of thousands of dollars being used to build state of the art incarceration centres for the aboriginal young men. They have become fodder for building projects. The ongoing horrendous present day stories in the north do not meet the interests of our media.

Amidst the Truth-Telling the Elders told fond stories of the Catholic Church and the many Sisters and Brothers who provided care and education in reading and writing language even when the governments legislated against these teaching initiatives. The Elders saw the church as a sacred place like country. A place where we share what we have to offer with love, compassion and meaning. Where we walk together and be sacred in our dreaming and creation. Where we thank God for the universe. We look to the heavens and listen to what the Milky Way tells our hearts. We marvel at the Emu dreaming and the song line of the Gospel. The need for us to sit down together with Christ in the centre of the circle.

Today our governments legislate against any form of Christian Spirituality being taught in our public schools. As a society we are suffering deeply as we notice the rise and the rise of mental turmoil, scepticism and relational disconnect. We give thanks for our indigenous brothers and sisters as they welcome us into their belonging and hope and pray we can sing the new song together in harmony.




ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE



What makes us feel secure? Many people look to tangible forms of security that will safeguard their livelihood and prepare for their future. We tend to associate security with things: the accumulation of goods and possessions, retirement funds, savings accounts, and substantial incomes. While acquiring these promises a life with less anxiety and worry, we actually find ourselves more preoccupied and consumed with their growth and preservation. We worry more! We can easily become quasi-hoarders, consumed with obtaining more tangible crutches. Our minds and hearts are always restless, and we never seem to be at peace.

Why do we so easily give our self-worth, value, and sense of security over to things? God certainly does not deny us the pursuit of a productive and enjoyable life but where do we draw the line? A sense of well-being and happiness can easily get deferred to sometime "in the future" while we continue to wrestle with the toils of today. There is no guarantee that there will be an earthly tomorrow and all of the frenzy we bring to securing our state in life will be for naught. When we are called from this world, will we even know where to begin to look for the tranquility and repose our souls so desperately need?

We cannot be hoarders, pursuers of vanity, or greedy. They just don't work as they are too dependent on things that can fall apart.
