Congratulations! Peter Doherty

This coming Thursday (July 20th), at St. Joseph's Cathedral in Rockhampton, Peter Doherty, who comes from Bundaberg, will be ordained a deacon by Bishop Michael. Along with bishops and priests, deacons are one of three groups or orders of ordained ministers, who provide sacramental, pastoral, and administrative leadership for our faith communities. Peter will be ordained as a "transitory" deacon as part of his movement towards ordination to the priesthood at some future time. Peter's ordination contrasts with "permanent" deacons who minister in the order permanently and who do not eventually transition to the priesthood.

However, between the two types of deacons there is no difference in their sacramental sign. Their function is the same. Vatican II restored the order to its original purpose (see *Ad Gentes* 16). A deacon is ordained to baptise, give homilies, lead the faithful in times of prayer, especially in the funeral liturgy outside of mass, and to officiate at weddings. Originally in the early church, deacons were given a special care of outreach to those living on the margins of society. Scripture scholars date the calling forth of the first deacons in the era of the New Testament, and the purpose of their ministry was to care for the poor on behalf of the bishop. Acts 6:1-6 recalls the ordination of "the seven" deacons by the laying on of hands. They were elected by the church to minister to the community of believers in Jerusalem, to enable the Apostles to concentrate on prayer and the Ministry of the Word, and to address a concern raised by Greek-speaking believers about the poor being overlooked. This ministry became known as *diakonia*, the Greek word for servant, and so the name "deacon" quickly came to be used.

We remember how the Second Vatican Council committed the Church to reaching out to the world with the Gospel (see especially the document called *Lumen Gentium*). It was that vision of the church that informed the restoration of deacons as we know them today: a clear role within the ministerial leadership of the church—a vocation and a participation in Holy Orders endowed precisely with the charism of service. Thus, Peter's ordination is a source of joy for the whole diocese. Everyone is welcome to attend Peter's diaconal ordination and our parish offers him our congratulations and our prayerful support, and especially we acknowledge Peter's parents, Terry and Adonna and his sister Siobhan.

PETER DOHERTY – Diaconate Ordination and parish attendance: Peter will be ordained Deacon in St Joseph's Cathedral on Thursday, July 20 at 11.00am. We congratulate Peter on this significant event on his journey to priesthood.

If you are wishing to attend, Shalom College has offered to make available one of their buses for the return trip. Probably the bus would depart at 6.00am approx. and return by 6.00pm.

As of this date we have only four parishioners who wish to avail of this opportunity. Please let the office (4151 6666) know by Tuesday 18th July if you want to book a seat.

CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP 8

A Disciple's Response

"As each one has received a gift, use it to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied grace" (1 Pt 4:10).

(The following relies heavily on the Pastoral Letter on Stewardship from the UNITED STATES CONFERENCE OF CATHOLIC BISHOPS 1992.)

CONVICTIONS

There are three convictions asked of us in the original pastoral letter.

It has been asked "if you were accused of being a Christian, a Catholic, would there be enough evidence to convict you?" In personalising this question, there opens for us a real examination of our life.

In looking at the three convictions below, let you and me read them, form them into accusatory questions and discern whether you or I would be convicted of being a disciple of Jesus.

1. Mature disciples make a conscious, firm decision, carried out in action, to be followers of Jesus Christ no matter the cost to themselves.

Question 1. Am I guilty of a conscious decision to follow Jesus Christ through good and bad times?

2. Beginning in conversion, change of mind and heart, this commitment is expressed not in a single action, nor even in a number of actions over a period of time, but in an entire way of life. It means committing one's very self to the Lord.

Question 2. Am I guilty of conversion in my life which has led me to a real change of mind and heart – a "sea change" of commitment to the Lord?

3. Stewardship is an expression of discipleship., with the power to change how we live out our lives. Disciples who practise stewardship recognise God as the origin of life, the giver of freedom, the source of all they have and are and will be. They know they are the recipients and caretakers of God's many gifts. They are grateful.

Question 3. Am I guilty of stewarding my gifts, talents and treasure as gifts to be grateful for and not mine to keep?

If we can discern that our answer to any or all the above is an unqualified yes, then we have a living legend and Saint in our midst. I dare say that, like me, you will probably come up with a percentage that is not too flattering, which leaves room for improvement or a new beginning. It is never too late to turn to the "source of all we have and are and will be" with gratitude in our hearts.

Live the Liturgy

It's not uncommon to hear people complain that we Catholics often fail in communicating our faith. Fair enough. We can and should improve there. But it's interesting to notice that Jesus himself was implicitly accused by his disciples of a similar failure. This week in Matthew's gospel they are perplexed that he speaks to the crowds in ambiguous parables. The Lord's riddles leave many people more confused than before. He responds by pointing out that his parables have an intentional dual purpose: to hide (for some) and to reveal (for others) his Gospel: "Because knowledge of the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven has been granted to you, but to them it has not been granted" (Matthew 13:11). Is Jesus being unnecessarily difficult, obscurantist, or, worse, elitist?

No. We have to remember that all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge lie hidden in him (c.f., Col. 2:3). He is the word of God from heaven to be planted in the earth of our humanity

to bear great fruit. However, like a lover delicately pursuing his beloved, we're dealing with a *relationship*, not new data. When we aren't willing to personally accept Jesus into our lives, the "info" of the Gospel will simply not make sense to us. It'll seem bizarre, esoteric, or like incoherent religious-speak. But when we are willing to accept Jesus into our lives, everything else starts to make sense. When others don't understand the Church or the Lord, let's be patient. Love is patient. Sometimes it has to hide before it is revealed.
