#### SYNODALITY in OUR PARISH

Last weekend, we were treated to an Open Forum on the Synodal Church. Fr Neil Muir, Rector of our Holy Spirit Seminary gave us a clear explanation of synodality explaining that it was not something new and had been part of our early Church dating back to the Apostles as recorded in the Acts of the Apostles.

The Apostles and others came together to pray, listen to each other, and discern the Spirit's inspiration over demands some were imposing on the pagan converts. It was Peter, as head of the Church, who wrote to the churches informing them that our Church was inclusive and made no demands upon people other than that they follow "the Way" and live lives in keeping with the teachings they had accepted. (Acts 15: 2 -35)

National, regional, and even provincial customs may differ but only one thing is necessary "to love God and to love your neighbour as yourself". (Matthew 22: 34-40)

As the Synod continues in Rome, there will no doubt be instances where "light bulb" moments will occur for all participants. These will not occur if synod members decide to reject the power of the Spirit by having closed minds and fixed ideas. "Walking together", "Synodos", "Concilium" are but words and phrases if they are not brought to life in the hearts, minds, and senses of the whole People of God.

Our thanks to Fr Neil whose explanation allowed us to more fully understand synodality. We pray for him and the seminarians whom he aptly described as "men swimming against the current of social opinion" by following the call to service as our future priests.

Fr Neil's visit highlights for many in our community where we have begun the synodal journey and where we have striven to listen to the cry of those who are in need in our community.

Last week saw the commencement of ALPHA. Approximately thirty-five people came together to share community, friendship, and their common search for God in their lives.

The program continues for the next eight weeks. You are welcome to join them on a Thursday evening commencing at 5.30pm with hospitality at Shalom College.

Previously in the Parish many were involved in the Summit and, in particular, its plenary sessions which lead to some reorganisation and re-evaluation.

In February next year, there will be an opportunity to "re-visit" the Summit and once again listen to each other as we strive to live out God's Mission in our community. More information will be forthcoming as planning commences.

Finally, let each one of us remember, as Pope Francis proposes to us, that our Church Servant Leadership Model is like an inverted pyramid. Dialogue with the world and all within it are the top section and from that comes the laity of our Church – the People of God. We are people of our world cognisant of the needs of the world in which we live. We are servants of that world not slaves. We are missionaries to that world not separated from it. And this is what we bring to the conversations in the Spirit which we have with our fellow travellers – our brothers and sisters in Christ, some of whom are called to serve as Deacons, Priests, Bishops, and one called to be Pope. The Servant Leadership Model is about leading and following, and the roles can be transported depending on the path's unmapped journey but with a definite destination in sight.

We are on the way, and we follow One who is "The Way, The Truth and The Light". (John 14: 6) The journey may take us where we least expect but it will only be efficacious if we keep our eye - **the Light**- on the destination – continual conversion of our world to **the Truth** of the Gospel - **the Way**.

With You alone to guide us, make Yourself at home in our hearts; Teach us the way we must go and how we are to pursue it.


We are weak and sinful;

B2.5 How can we renew and promote the Bishop's ministry from a missionary synodal perspective?

Information from the Continental Assemblies.

The College of Bishops participates in the synodal process when each Bishop initiates, guides and concludes the consultation of the People of God entrusted to him and when the assembled Bishops exercise the charism of discernment in various assembles.

The synodal process asks Bishops to live a radical trust in the action of the Spirit in the life of their communities, without fear that the participation of everyone need be a threat to their ministry of community leadership.

The consultation of the People of God has highlighted how becoming a synodal Church also implies a broader involvement of all in discernment, which requires a rethinking of decision-making processes. Consequently, there is need for adequate governance structures which respond to the demand for greater transparency and accountability.

There is an equally strong awareness that all authority in the Church proceeds from Christ and is guided by the Holy Spirit. A diversity of charisms without authority, becomes anarchy, just as the rigour of authority without the richness of charisms, ministries and vocations becomes dictatorship. The Church is, at the same time, synodal and hierarchical.

To proceed with the renewal of the episcopal ministry within a more fully synodal Church requires cultural and structural changes, a lot of mutual trust and above all, trust in the Lord's guidance. Hence the hope for the widespread use of the dynamic of "Conversations in the Spirit"

The ministry of the Bishop also includes belonging to the College of Bishops and consequently exercising co-responsibility for the whole Church.

#### QUESTION FOR REFLECTION/DISCERNMENT

How do we understand the vocation and mission of the Bishop in a synodal missionary perspective? What renewal of the vision and exercise of episcopal ministry is needed for a synodal Church characterised by co-responsibility?

## GOSPEL MEDITATION ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

I confess that I have a soft spot for the scary things Jesus says because they are usually ignored. But there's gold in them that hills, if we have courage to look. This week Jesus gives us a terrifying warning in his parable about the king who gives a marriage feast for his son and promptly goes berserk when people don't respond. The point: those who do not properly respond to God's generous invitation will face totally devastating consequences. The invitees who don't show up get their city burned to the ground. The poor homeless man is tortured for not wearing the correct clothes. Scary indeed.

Is Jesus trying to intimidate or bully us into following him? No, because that is certainly not how he treats anyone in the Gospels. A better view is this: to Jesus, your life matters. The universe is not an empty wasteland where anything goes. It is a theater of love offered and either accepted or rejected. How easy it can be to glide through life thinking my life doesn't make a difference. But it does. It really does.

This should not only be sobering but exhilarating. The positive side of the negative in Jesus' scary parables is the thrill and joy that he is inviting us, therefore our lives matter a great deal. There is a reason to get up in the morning. God's generous love is relentlessly calling us. True, obstinately saying no through our indifference is a catastrophe for us and those around us. But how wonderful must the consequences of our 'yes' be?
