PRIESTS' RETREAT



The priests of our diocese recently attended a retreat led by Father Gray, a Columban priest. The retreat took place from the 8th to the 13th of October and was an enlightening and spiritually invigorating experience. Throughout the five days, we explored various thought-provoking topics that deepened our understanding of the church's role in our increasingly globalised world.

On the first day of the retreat, Bishop Michael presided over the Mass, where we paid tribute to all the priests who had passed away from our diocese and the priests who were deceased among various dioceses and congregations working in our Diocese. This served as a solemn reminder of the sacrifices made by these individuals in service of God and His Church. The day's theme was the Global World and the Church, where we discussed the challenges the modern Church faces in a world that is becoming increasingly interconnected.

The second day focused on synodality, discernment, power, and coping with power. Father Gray guided us through these topics, emphasising the need for collaborative decision-making within the Church and the responsible use of power. Throughout the retreat, Father Gray encouraged us to interpret our lives and experiences in the light of the Bible, allowing us to approach the challenges of the modern world with faith and clarity. These days were a transformative journey that allowed the priests to reflect on their place within the global Church, highlighting the importance of embracing diversity, engaging in collaborative decision-making, and addressing the pressing global issues of our time. As we left the retreat, we were reminded of our calling as Christians to be the light in the darkness and to actively work towards creating a better world for all.

Do not let ignorance lead us down the wrong path


nor partiality influence our actions.



B3 Participation, governance and authority. (What processes, structures and institutions are needed in a missionary synodal Church?)

B3.1 How can we renew the service of authority and the exercise of responsibility in a missionary synodal Church?

Information from the Continental Assemblies.

- a. Authority, responsibility and governance roles sometimes succinctly referred to by the English term leadership take a variety of forms within the Church.
- b. In particular, they all share the call to be configured to the example of the Master, who said of himself "I am among you as one who serves" (Lk 22:27). "For the disciples of Jesus, yesterday, today and always, the only authority is the authority of service". (Pope Francis. Address at the ceremony commemorating the 50th Anniversary of the institution of the Synod of Bishops. 17th October, 2015.)
- c. The documents of this first phase express some characteristics of the exercise of authority and responsibility in a missionary synodal Church: an attitude of service and not of power or control; transparency, encouragement and the flourishing of the person; a capacity for and competence of vision, discernment, inclusion, collaboration and delegation. Above all, the ability and willingness to listen.... more participatory selection procedures (for those in leadership).
- d. A transparent and accountable approach is fundamental to an authentically evangelical exercise of authority and responsibility.
- e. The Continental Assemblies point to experiences in which power and decision-making processes have been appropriated to some in positions of authority and responsibility. They link these experiences to the culture of clericalism and the different forms of abuse (sexual, financial, spiritual and of power), which erode the credibility of the church.

QUESTION FOR REFLECTION/DISCERNMENT

How can authority and responsibility be understood and exercised such that it serves the participation of the whole People of God? What renewal of vision, and forms of concrete exercise of authority, responsibility and governance, are needed in order to grow as a missionary synodal Church?

GOSPEL MEDITATION ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

With little more than a year until the United States' national elections, I find myself feeling, like many Catholics, both dread and energized. Dread, because our democratic republic can be a messy endeavor and campaigns a long, nasty, and unedifying slog; energized, because hope for positive societal change can be enticing and engaging. As a pastor, I see similar conflicting attitudes in those whom I serve. How can Catholics best engage our political arena in a way which is truly helpful and worthwhile?

This weeks' gospel reading offers wisdom in this regard. Jesus says, "Render therefore to Caesar the things are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's." This riddle forces us to answer for ourselves a hidden question: what is the relationship between political and divine authority? Two common but false answers lead to mischief. If we answer that the two are equivalent, politics becomes our absolute authority. This happens whenever religion is slave to the state, as in the travesty of the pro-Nazi German Christian movement in the 1930s and 40s. It also usually occurs when there is an official state religion. If we answer that the two are totally unrelated, we end up with an unchecked aggressive secularist state as we often experience now. Thus, religion becomes a weak and private pastime.

What's a better alternative? At our best, Christians hold that political authority does indeed have its own legitimate autonomy but is nested within God's allencompassing authority. Think, for example, of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s respect for politics while also being able to criticize unjust human laws because he recognized a higher heavenly law. In other words, Caesar owns politics — and God owns Caesar. So, we should allow Jesus' words to lead us to have a deep respect and willingness to peacefully engage in politics without making that engagement our religion. We bring our faith to bear on our politics knowing confidently that Caesar isn't God — but he is indeed God's.
