#### I/ME (INDIVIDUALITY) and WE/US (COMMUNION).

Probably the I/Me syndrome came into prominence in Australia in the 1970's. The Australian culture of "mateship" started its decline with this new syndrome. Historians might point more accurately to event/s which brought this about.

Be that as it may, the culture of I/Me gained momentum and infiltrated all communities including the Christian community. The main impact in our Catholic community was evident in the sudden diminution of men and women answering God's call to priesthood and Religious Life. Simultaneously, there was a record number of departures from both the Priesthood and Religious Life. Leaders and members of the Presbyterate and Religious Orders did not see it coming as they built bigger seminaries and houses of training. Most of these today have either been sold or have taken on a different use as Spirituality Centres, University Campuses, Conference Centres or the like.

Today, our population in its 60s and 70s and all decades below did not experience the depression, World War II, rationing and want. Parents of the older age groups had first-hand experience and vowed to make the life of their children better. They did and inadvertently brought to life "It is all about ME – my good, my success, my wealth and my life."

An exaggeration? Certainly. "Mateship" still exists but it is such that it receives publicity due to its limited occurrence.

The Australian virtue of mateship (We/Us) never required notoriety. It was done without pomp and ceremony. It was done because it was the right thing to do. It was done without seeking reward. It was done with good intention. And, perhaps, it was done with a Christian motive of Loving God, by Loving God present in one's neighbour.

Charity – real charity – has been a hallmark of Christianity. Putting others before oneself and ensuring others were treated with dignity as Children of God and therefore brothers and sisters underpinned Christian charity.

Although our society has become increasingly materialistic, and although the prevailing I/Me syndrome is highly evident, there exists pockets of Christians who retain and develop a We/Us culture of living.

One of these pockets is the parishioners of the Catholic Parish of Bundaberg. The outreach of our parishioners goes beyond taking all things for oneself and reaches out to those in need in so many ways. Its vibrancy can be felt in the number who respond in giving of their time, talents, and treasure to support their brothers and sisters. Theirs could well be the Prayer of St Ignatius of Loyola:

Lord, teach me to be generous.



Teach me to serve you as you deserve to be served;
to give without counting the cost,
to fight without heeding the wounds,
to toil without seeking rest,
to labour without asking for reward,
except that of knowing that I do your Holy will.

Amen

Let us celebrate that GIVING, SERVING, GENEROSITY, TOILING, UNSELFISHNESS (It is all about WE/US) by coming together to say thanks.

Fr. Don invites you to this celebration of gratefulness on November 22<sup>nd</sup>. We trust you can be there as we celebrate all parishioners who have been counter-cultural in giving in accordance with the words of Jesus "Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me. (Matthew 25: 40)

## GOSPEL MEDITATION ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

Lately I've been enjoying the deep meaning of Eastern icons. I love how they express a tapestry of meaning in a way that can surpass the written or spoken word. Today's parable of the ten virgins from Jesus is a good example. Try googling "wise and foolish virgins icon" and you'll see an image of how our Christ meets our heart's deepest needs if we attend to him with the proper attitude.

I'm serious. Take a moment to google and look at it. See how it depicts the risen Jesus behind a closed door with the five wise virgins with lighted lamps. He gazes with them toward the five foolish and lamp-less virgins, symbolizing the outward looking of divine love for the lost. Moreover, the wedding feast is no ordinary one. It takes place in a walled city and garden, indicating it's a new Jerusalem and a return to Eden. The table isn't typical, either. It's a Eucharistic feast. Now we see that the door in Jesus' parable is the way into the church, where Christ is the new light burning amidst the dark midnight of this world.

The richness continues. We notice, too, that the foolish virgins look exactly the same as the wise ones in their clothes, hair, and expressions. The only difference is they departed to buy oil and now they are sadly excluded. We often act like consumers in the marketplace to fulfill our need for love and mercy. We'll always end up disappointed if we shop around. Jesus sums up the moral of the story this way: "Watch therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour." Watch, remain, don't spiritually shop. It is always better to quietly remain close to the Eucharistic community of the Church, even if ye feel like our oil has run out. This week let's consider placing the icon of the wise and foolish virgins on our phone lock screen or computer desktop to help us remember to stay close to him, especially when life
