

We often find ourselves extending our hands to shake another's hand in support; or we place our hand on their shoulder. No words are really needed. In our lives, our hands in particular, play a very important role.

Just as Jesus used his hands in some of our recent Sunday Gospels:



Mark 1:29-39

"Simon's mother-in-law had gone to bed with fever, and they told him about her straightaway. He went to her, took her by the hand and helped her up. And the fever left her and she began to wait on them."

Let us ask Jesus to take us by the hand and help us as he helped Simon's mother-in-law.

Then, with our spirits uplifted, we will go out with a renewed desire to share God's love with others.

Mark 1:40-45 "A leper came to Jesus and pleaded on his knees: 'If you want to' he said 'you can cure me.' Feeling sorry for him, Jesus stretched out his hand and touched him. 'Of course I want to!' he said. 'Be cured!' And the leprosy left him at once and he was cured." Jesus not only heals a leper; he lays his hand upon him. It is a gesture of acceptance (and perhaps even solidarity) with a social outcast.

I am not saying that we can work miracles, but we can be of comfort and support to our friends, families and those we meet everyday. Look at your hands and think of how often you use them. They may be wrinkled, shaky or worn from hard work. Think of when your hands held your new born child; or when you held your little grandchild's hand to walk them safely across the street; or when you held your aging parent's hand to guide and support them.

A wave of your hand indicates hello, goodbye, how are you? We reach out to others. Jesus used his hands to bear the burden of others, to feed the hungry. Think of when we exchange a sign of peace in the Mass – we can get a sense of sincerity and joy. When we pray we join our hands together and we feel a sense of stillness. The action of putting hands together when engaging in prayer, has a great symbolic value of support. When you pray, you are not alone.

I recently attended the ordination of Fr Peter Doherty where Bishop Michael and all the priests present participated in the "Laying on of Hands" – the invoking of the Holy Spirit. Shortly after, we had the "Anointing of Hands" with Chrism by Bishop Michael, so that Fr Peter might be guarded and preserved by Christ to scantify the people and offer sacrifice to God. What beautiful rituals!

Our hands are such important mediators of social contact. They enrich our communication with gestural expression. Our hands give blessing; they receive and they give. They convey thoughts and emotions without us even knowing it.

We are so grateful for the gift of our hands and the work they do.

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture



Our national pastime isn't baseball. lt's what the Bible calls "condemning the world." We generally enjoy pronouncing curses upon those whom we see as trouble, wrong, or evil. Don't believe me? Listen to almost any podcast, cable news network, or social media platform to hear it. It will be some version of: "We all agree that if they are eradicated, things will be great." Condemning is almost always clothed in virtue. It basks in its good intentions. That's why it is so

attractive. Condemning seems like our best path to saving what is good.

What a shock, then, to hear Jesus announce: **"For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him" (Jn 3:17).** He comes to save the world, as we all want, but he will accomplish it *without an act of condemnation.* How hard it is to accept this! Condemning feels godlike. I judge who and what must be lost to protect the good. But in the light of Jesus' endless mercy and love, this is the *least* godlike thing we can do.

Lenten challenge: This week, I invite you to give up the delicious experience of condemning whomever in the world you most would like to see gone. Perhaps write down their names. Secondly, I invite you to consider fasting from any media that feeds the tasty but deadly tendency to condemn.
