WORD of GOD Sunday - February 5th

"He opened their minds to understand the scriptures." (Luke 24:45)

It is less than four years (October 2019) since Pope Francis wrote his apostolic letter *Aperuit Illis* instituting the Sunday of the Word of God. The scripture passage takes us to the road to Emmaus, walking with those disciples going away from Jerusalem in the aftermath of the death of Jesus. The disciples were defeated; their world had been shattered; they were incredulous; and they could not stay in the city which crucified the person in whom they had placed their hope.

The similarities between the disciples on the road to Emmaus and the Jews being carried off into exile are a lesson for us today. For the Jews in captivity, in exile in Babylon it is no wonder that they wept for a return to their homeland and home city. Jerusalem was the archetypal "city on a hill" – a place from which light emanates and a place which cannot be hidden.


We too have been in an exilic place. The light emanating from our worshipping gatherings was dimmed and diminished. We too may have sat and wept, hung up our harps unable to sing our songs of praise in a foreign atmosphere. The past few years have seen us walk away also, not necessarily by choice, from the regular Sunday liturgical celebrations. COVID may have kept us away from gatherings of the faithful, but the Word of God may have become more alive to us as we reflected in our isolation on the daily readings provided in our liturgical calendar.

Now we have returned and now is the time to reignite "a celebration, study and dissemination of the word of God". There is an invitation to return to our home with God, gathered "as one" around the sacred Scripture (Neh 8:1) just as those returning after the Babylonian exile, and just as those disciples on the road to Emmaus who on hearing the scriptures and breaking the bread returned to Jerusalem (Luke 24:33).

When the covid cloud began to lift, we saw peoples' thirst for reflection on God's Word being satiated by faith formation gatherings and their like here in our Parish.

Pope Francis affirms this in writing: "The Bible is a book of the Lord's people, who in listening to it, move from dispersion and division to unity. The word of God unites believers and makes them one people." To reflect on the scriptures each Sunday brings hope, strength and resolve to the faithful. The opportunity is ours once again as we renew ourselves spiritually following the dispersion and separation caused through the pandemic restrictions.

May our celebration of the Sunday of the Word of God embrace the Spirit being so generously poured out over us. As Pope Francis says: "The Holy Spirit, then, makes sacred Scripture the living word of God, experienced and handed down in the faith of the people."

ADULT FAITH - "The Mass": - In the Homily the Heart of Christ speaks to the human heart a beautiful happening with Priest and people using all their available talent for the glory of God. Vestments put the Priest in disguise, hiding the man and pointing to Christ, the One who is really preaching the homily and proclaiming the Gospel. As with his close disciples in explaining his parables in more detail Christ is, in the homily, sowing his word into the soil of our hearts - scattering and sowing the good seed of his word. Why: because we are destined for relationship with God now and for all eternity. Just to dream of Paradise though would be to risk leaving this world behind. To think of Paradise means to stay resolutely in this world, in the belief that the Word took flesh once in time and the Word, the real truth about the human being may be found in the Incarnation. This is why we really listen to the Homily, the revelations of Jesus Christ for our 'postmodern' world. What emerges in Christ is a magnificent vision of infinite possibility, and this translates into the human possibility to transcend a culture that sees sin and death as endemic to the human condition. So we approach the homily with expectation and recognise that Christ is speaking to his people and expect to be enlightened and challenged. RECOGNISE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS - The Humble of the Earth

When I think of the Beatitudes, I think of collectible coffee mugs emblazoned with the words *Blessed are the peacemakers*, with little pastel flowers stenciled in the white spaces of the lettering. I think of greeting cards and decorative wall hangings.

Why? These are the Beatitudes, for heaven's sake — revolutionary and radical. An uncompromising impeachment of worldly values. They are the opposite of banal.

But I cringed from my head to my toes when I read my first draft of this reflection, a retelling of a time in my life when I decided to embrace humility and meekness. I realized that the Beatitudes aren't something I can tell you about. Poverty of spirit, the hunger for righteousness, the gladness God gives to the downtrodden — these are concepts that must be animated within us. They must be lived. So instead of telling you my story, I want you to tell yours.

I invite you to think of a time when you were vulnerable. When you were discouraged or humbled or felt like a failure. A time when you were cut low. The loss of a job, perhaps, or the rejection of a loved one. The abrupt end of some road that you felt sure would be long and prosperous.

Resentment, envy, and vengefulness flourish in moments like this. Did you experience those feelings? Did you embrace them? Did you want to?

What did the world tell you this moment should mean?

What does Christ tell you it should mean? Have you figured it out, or are you still working on it?

Saint Vs. Blessed

Question:

What is the difference between a "Saint" and a "Blessed"?

Answer:

The process of proclaiming someone as a saint in the Catholic Church has evolved over the course of many centuries. In the beginning, those honored as saints were almost exclusively biblical figures or martyrs. However, after the legalization of Christianity in the fourth century, new holy women and men came to be honoured as saints, and this was often done by popular acclaim or by the local bishop or abbot.

It was Pope Gregory IX (who was pope from 1227 to 1241) who officially proclaimed that only the pope had the authority to add someone to the official list (the "canon") of saints. This is the meaning of the word "canonization."

Today, the saint-making process includes several steps, including detailed studies of the person's life and a recognition that they died as a martyr or lived a life of "heroic virtue." Once someone is recognized as a martyr or if a miracle is attributed to their intercession, they will be beatified and honored as "Blessed." This means that they can be celebrated by Catholics in a particular country or region or by the members of certain religious community. If another miracle occurs and is approved, then the "Blessed" is canonized and honoured with the title "Saint," meaning that they are now officially recognized as a universal model of holiness and an intercessor.



In my parents' bedroom there were on the wall two photos of my mom and dad from their early adulthoods. The photo of my mother entranced me when I was a boy. I loved looking at it, even though I saw her in daily life. Something about that picture captured her perfectly. It was an image of the joy, wisdom, beauty, and strength that enveloped me from the start of my life. It was an icon of the woman who fed, taught, and encouraged me. I felt a deep pride that I came from such beauty.

The beatitudes of Jesus are a kind of self-portrait. But it is a strange picture. At first, the blessings of being poor, mourning, and hungering and thirsting for righteousness may seem bizarre or, worse, a religious delusion. Who wants to look like that? But if we look again, we begin to see the characteristics of Jesus' form. He becomes poor and fills it with his riches for us, he weeps and mourns for us, and fills it with his joy, he hungers and thirsts for us to be righteous, and so satisfies us. And so on. It's the way he appears on the cross.

Perhaps we should put on our bedroom room walls the words of the beatitudes next to a crucifix of the Lord Jesus. Then we can do what the beatitudes are designed for, to gaze at the joy, wisdom, beauty, and strength of the one who is our origin, and who is with us every day. And little by little, we'll start to look like him.
