"Waste Time with People"

Principal St Patrick's

This week we celebrate St. Patrick's Day. When I grew up attending St. Patrick's, I remember celebrating with green cochineal doused foods, shamrock colouring activities and the story of an extraordinary man, who chased snakes away from Ireland. I am sure there was a whole lot more teaching and learning that occurred around this traditional feast day, but these were the highlights my young memory clung to. I never did understand the snake part of the story, but it made Ireland a desirable place to visit in my mind and increased my curiosity.

Many years later, I realised my dream of visiting this lovely 'snake free' destination. With the name 'O'Shea' it felt like returning home and the locals were so very welcoming. Not unlike our own St. Patrick's community. My visit to Ireland included a visit to Baggot Street. In the picture below, you'll see the renowned red hinged door of the 'House of Mercy'. This little gem of a school, strategically placed in the most affluent part of town, forced the 'haves' to rub shoulders with the 'have nots' and still runs today. Catherine McAuley used a large inheritance to build this school, in her bid to break the poverty cycle for many women and saw the birth of the 'Sisters of Mercy' who would go on to spread out across 40 countries and forge the humble beginnings of our very own school, St. Patrick's. Sullivan (2005) states how Catherine believed that the development of girls' and women's talents was conducive to the good of society and she saw religious education as the centrepiece of a truly merciful education. She could also see that an inclusive community could be built from giving vulnerable woman skills that the wealthy would seek. She acknowledged a natural right to human dignity for all, despite financial status, and a passion to educate all children in unison. Catherine encouraged a strong sense of community and a mutual respect.

On Bishop's Inservice Day, we wondered why our own Mercy school was called St. Patrick's? It may have been our strong Irish connection, but I believe the parallels run much deeper. Both characters were separated from their parents from a young age, making them vulnerable but resilient individuals who were able to overcome life's struggles, with a closeness to God. Similarly, they were both able to call on the inner strength gained from negative life experience. They then used the biproduct of courage, to carry out God's work for the benefit of those, also made vulnerable due to life circumstance. St. Patrick was less of a 'reptile repellent' than a man who strove for human rights and justice. Hoyt (2019) goes as far to sug-

gest that St. Patrick, who was captured to slavery early in life, was the first Christian voice calling for the end of this practice. St. Patrick and Catherine McAuley were both drawn to a life of charity and answered a vocational call. This unearthed for me, on a much deeper level, the Mercy connection to our St. Patrick's school.

Catherine McAuley was an avid writer and was known to enjoy spending time with others, through the sharing of a good cup of tea. She challenged peers to 'waste time with people... as a good beginning is of great importance'. Catherine McAuley also suggested that one should 'dance every evening' so it was more than fitting that we celebrated Dance Night this week, adorned with shamrocks, but more importantly, joining together as community. This St. Patrick's Day, we have managed to celebrate not only our Irish heritage, but more importantly the mercy connection of our school and parish.

ADULT FAITH - The Mass. Within the Eucharistic Prayer is the Epiclesis: Make holy, therefore, these gifts, we pray, by sending down your Spirit upon them like the dewfall, so that they may become + for us the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ. As the Priest says this prayer, he first spreads his hands over the bread and wine then blesses them with the Sign of the Cross. The laying on of hands, as occurs in Baptism, Confirmation, Reconciliation, the Sacrament of the Sick and Ordination, is the traditional gesture when the Church confers the Holy Spirit, as witnessed to frequently in the Acts of the Apostles. In our Western tradition, a bell may ring at this point of the Mass to awaken us to the importance of what is happening. A question which has been asked for centuries: which prayer makes Christ present in the Mass? Is it the Epiclesis (the Invocation) or the Words of Our Lord at the Last Supper? The Catechism's answer is both: At the heart of the Eucharistic celebration are the bread and wine that, by the words of Christ and the invocation of the Holy Spirit, become Christ's Body and Blood. The Council of Florence in 1439, referring to the words of Our Lord at the Last Supper, declared that these divine words of the Saviour have all the power of transubstantiation. The Church's response is, therefore, that the whole of the Eucharistic Prayer itself is consecratory; it is the Eucharistic Prayer as such that effects transubstantiation. Live the Liturgy

When I became the pastor of a large parish, I soon found myself, for the first time in my life, riddled with anxiety, headaches, difficulty making decisions, and fatigue. I called a therapist friend and told her my symptoms and asked if she thought I needed a serious medical exam. She said, "How much water do you drink?" I told her, "I haven't had time to drink water lately." She responded, "You're chronically dehydrated. Drink eighty-five ounces a day and call me in a week." I started guzzling water and in a week all my symptoms went away. I felt great.

Like me, the people in the Exodus wanderings were dehydrated. But unlike me, they knew it. Their symptoms were bad. They fight with each other. They accuse God of being a monster who wants them and their children to die of thirst. Their thirst drives them to plot the bloody assassination of the man who rescued them. God responds by using Moses to strike a rock from which rivers of living waters flow to quench their thirst for years to come.

The Holy Spirit is the living water of love which flows from the pierced side of Jesus, the new Moses. What symptoms in your life suggest you're spiritually dehydrated? Anger at God? Cynicism at your leaders? Bitter rivalry and bickering with others? Don't panic. Of course we have those symptoms. Ask God to provide his water to quench your spiritual thirst, and he will. And all those symptoms will soon disappear.

RESPONSE TO MEDIA REPORTS ABOUT RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION (RI) IN STATE SCHOOLS

You may be aware of stories recently, in the Courier Mail, Channel 7 and 9 about Religious Instruction in our Queensland State Schools. This has been pushed by groups who would like RI to be removed from curriculum time in our schools. As usual, there has been a lot of misinformation promoted by them to make the story more sensational. The video which was contained in the online Courier Mail article was several years old and had been edited to push their point of view.

Some fast facts about State School Religious Instruction:

It is part of a holistic education, RI enables children to question, explore and discover faith for themselves, students only participate in RI if opted in by parents or carers. It is all about parent choice.

RI is popular and is in over 600 schools around the state, (13 in the Bundaberg area), with over 200 000 children having consent to attend. Unfortunately, not all students consented into RI can be part of an RI class, due to a lack of volunteers.

A multicultural Queensland is a multifaith Queensland and to support this there are many options for RI e.g. Baha'i RI, Buddhist RI, Christian RI, Jewish, Islamic etc. Only Christian RI is offered here in Bundaberg, but others could be available if their faiths wished it. RI supports student wellbeing where children are taught faith-based values. Only accredited RI instructors can teach RI. These instructors need to complete training and have a current blue card.

An Independent panel of curriculum experts reviews approved RI curriculum, which must be used in the RI classes.

School staff supervise all RI classes, which last about half an hour per week. We have 30 Instructors, 9 of whom are Catholic going into the 13 schools in the Bundaberg area. There are many classes in these 13 who do not have RI and several schools who have none, due to not enough volunteers. I would like to thank our 9 parishioners who have taken up this ministry to "Go out and teach the Good News to the world". Even if you don't feel you could be an RI instructor, you can help by spreading the positive aspects of RI amongst your friends and colleagues, praying for the continuation of RI and/or contacting our local state members of parliament to state that you support RI and ask them if they do too.

Hopefully through these actions we can ensure Religious Instruction continues during curriculum time in our state schools.
