Welcome to the Parish



25th/26th March 2023

J. Bishop Whichael WhcCarthy, do install you, Fr Don White, as Parish Priest of The Catholic Parish of Bundaberg. I confer on you all the responsibilities, duties, obligations and rights of this office, especially the sacramental and pastoral care of the People of God within this Parish. Through Christ Our Lord Amen.

With these words, following the *Profession of the Creed* and the *Oath of Fidelity*, Bishop Michael McCarthy installed Fr Don White as parish priest of Bundaberg at the 9am Mass at St. Patrick's church last Sunday. The assembled community, replied, "Amen" to those words in a clear recognition of Fr Don's appointment.

The rite of installation of a new parish priest reflects liturgically what is written in the Church's canon law and other documents, that a parish priest is the leader of the faith community. When such a rite is celebrated, it is important to stop and see what our Church is saying to us in word and symbol. The bishop prayed the prayer of installation over Fr. Don while he was sitting in the presidential chair. This was a symbolic recognition that Fr. Don is not elected to the position of the parish priest of our parish, but rather appointed by the bishop. This moment reflected that the bishop is the chief teacher of the local church or diocese, and as a successor to the apostles governs the church in communion with the Bishop of Rome. Fr. Don and all the priests of the Church are the "co-workers" of the bishop in that role, and the parish priest is appointed to be responsible for a particular parish.

The rite of installation on Sunday, requires that Fr Don uphold, in both word and action, the entire teachings of our Faith and the laws and regulations of our Church. It asks Fr Don to live out the threefold ministry of the ordained priesthood, i.e., sanctifying, teaching, and governing, as well as caring for the People of God sacramentally and pastorally, in the example of Christ, the Good Shepherd. That does not mean that all that happens for the People of God in Bundaberg is now the total responsibility of Fr Don. We can't all sit back and say that we don't have the "Grace of Office" because it was conferred on one person. Rather, through the grace and call we received at our Christian baptism, we share, with Fr. Don and Fr. Sijo in the mission of our faith community, simply to bring others to Christ.

Pope Francis, who has often spoken of the co-responsibility

that priests and people share for the mission of the Church retuned to this point recently, saying "The experience of the Twelve Apostles and the testimony of Paul also challenge us today. They invite us to verify our attitudes, to verify our choices, our decisions, on the basis of these fixed points: everything depends on a gratuitous call from God; God also chooses us for services that at times seem to exceed our capacities or do not correspond to our expectations; the call received as a gratuitous gift must be answered gratuitously. It is a call that concerns both those who have received the sacrament of Orders, consecrated persons, and all lay faithful, man or woman: it is a call to all. You, the treasure you have received with your Christian vocation, are obliged to give it: it is the dynamic nature of life. It is a call that empowers them to actively and creatively perform their apostolic task, within a Church in which 'there is a diversity of ministry but a oneness of mission'.3

The Pope continues "The laity too: all of you, the majority of you are lay people. The laity likewise share in the priestly, prophetic, and royal office of Christ and therefore have their own share in the mission of the whole people of God in the Church and in the world." In these words, Pope Francis is speaking about the co-responsibility that the laity share with priests in the mission of the Church.

We too with Pope Francis can pray that our common dignity and equality inspire us to even greater unity and cooperation in proclaiming by word and example, the Good News of Jesus Christ, in co-responsibility for the mission with our new Parish Priest. We offer Fr. Don our full and prayerful support as we work with him in serving Christ in the mission of our faith community.

St James' Church 38 See Street Bargara ADULT FAITH: The Mass—In Memory of Me

The Jews had a very different understanding of *memorial* from ourselves. Moses had ordered that the Exodus from Egypt (God's central act of salvation in the Old Testament) should be commemorated annually and at the same time of year as it actually occurred. This *Memorial*, should take the form of a celebratory feast (the Passover) (cf. Leviticus 23:5-8), celebrating that they had become and still were God's covenanted People. Jesus brought this biblical celebration of the Passover to its total fulfilment, just as He brings to completion everything else in the Old Testament, and just as he promised He would in the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5:17). So, in his bringing the Passover Meal to its fulfilment, He keeps the meal; he keeps the remembrance and thanksgiving for salvation and for freedom, but he raises everything to a higher plain. From now on, his disciples would continue to thank God for all that He did for the Jewish People and throughput their history: but now there is an altogether new dimension. Christians would henceforth give thanks for the wondrous liberation and salvation won for them by the victorious death and resurrection of God's Son.

From now on, the Lord's Death and Resurrection would not be just in the mind, but also in outward reality, in actual fact, in the consecrated elements, in the Sacrament of the Eucharist. The celebration of the Holy Mass, the *Memorial of the Lord*, makes Christ present in the actual event of his Last Supper. From Christ's own lips we hear the sacred words of consecration; from Christ's own hands we receive the Bread of Life and the Cup of eternal Salvation. Live the Liturgy

Of all Jesus' miracles, the most unsettling might be when he made a dead person alive. We know of three times when he did so: a girl, a young man, and Lazarus. The miracle teaches us he has the power of life and death. He anticipates his resurrection. Sin hurts us. Some sin kills us, spiritually. The three miracles reveal to us that no matter our circumstances, Jesus can give life to us.

The three miracles are instructive of the three ways we feel dead. The little dead girl symbolizes sin before it has time to mature. She's in bed and, once alive, gets right back to her life. The young man is lying in his casket in a funeral procession. This is sin allowed to fester, to grow and become somewhat normalized. Once raised, he has a short walk back home. Lazarus, a full-grown dead man, lies wrapped in burial bands in the tomb. Once he is raised, much needs to be done. He'll need to remove those bands, find new clothes, and travel all the way back home. That is sin allowed to go all the way, unchecked for months or years. It's the most spectacular of the three and reveals Jesus' glory more than the others.

What hope that should give us, for us and those whom we love! Jesus knows our sin hurts us and can even kill us spiritually. No matter the extent of the damage, he is always ready for the miracle of making the dead fully alive. Father John Muir ©LPi

HOLY LAND COMMISSARIAT Holy Land (Good Friday) Collection

For 800 years, the Franciscan Friars have shared the difficult lives of Christians in the countries that make up the Franciscan Custody of the Holy Land: Israel and Palestine, Egypt, Syria, Jordan, Lebanon, Rhodes and Cyprus.

The people of these countries face their own difficulties, but particularly Christians due to their minority status. Among them, the friars have never ceased offering their pastoral care.

The annual collection for the support of the church in the Holy Land will take place on Good Friday, April 7th. Last year the Diocese of Rockhampton contributed \$14,566.00 Our Parish contribution was \$2,300. The 27 Archdioceses and Dioceses and 3 Eparchies in Australia contributed \$1,496,693.11.
