ANZAC REFLECTIONS

n April 25th, 1915, Australian and New Zealand soldiers landed on the beach at Gallipoli. They were met with a barrage of fire from the Turkish soldiers who were positioned on the cliffs. The battle lasted for eight months before the remaining force was evacuated. Thousands had died and many others were injured. Although many returned to Australia, they too suffered the aftermath of war mentally and physically.

Remembrance: Although it is 108 years since this landing occurred we still remember these men and women who volunteered to serve to protect the peace and values of Australia and its allies. These soldiers and nurses faced the unknown with courage and spirit. I always think of the parents who farewelled their sons. Today with God's help and prayer, we too could follow their courageous example as we are faced with difficult situations.



ADULT FAITH: The Mass—The Doxology

All the Eucharistic Prayers end with exactly the same words. The Priest, holding the sacred Host on the paten in the one hand and the Chalice in the other, sings or says. Through Him, and with Him and in Him, O God almighty Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory is yours for ever and ever.

The Amen with which the People respond to these words is called the *Great Amen*. We say Amen at the end of every prayer, a word which simply means *I agree with what has been said*. The Priest speaks out the Eucharistic Prayer on our behalf, as our representative before God. It is our Prayer. Our Amen at its conclusion is our assertion that we accept and believe with all our hearts what has been said and done on our behalf, and particularly that we agree with this final statement which, in a sense, sums up the entire Eucharistic Prayer. And our Yes to what has been said and done in the Eucharistic Prayer is indeed a mighty Yes, a Great Amen.

These final words of the Eucharistic Prayers are called the **Doxology**, a word that means speaking out praise or giving glory. It is important to acknowledge and appreciate that our prayer of praise asserts that all glory is being given to the Father through Him (Christ) and with Him and in Him - to the Father. Only through Christ can we give God any praise at all and the man Christ Jesus who is with us always is the one mediator between God and mankind, the man Christ Jesus (1Tim 2:5). CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP

A Disciple's Response

"As each one has received a gift, use it to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied grace"

1 Pt 4:10

In 2008, the Catholic Parish of Bundaberg began the journey of becoming a STEWARDSHIP PARISH. In the intervening fifteen years, we have seen the journey take us to places we may never have dreamed of going ourselves but, collectively, we have trod, stumbled, run and ventured into an unknown territory to become who we are today.

It seems an opportune time to revisit some of the basic lessons we learned along the way so that we can gain strength to walk on together, inspired by the Spirit, who leads us, hopefully with breath that is at our backs, encouraging us forward. (The following relies heavily on the Pastoral Letter on Stewardship from the UNITED STATES CONFERENCE OF CATHOLIC BISHOPS 1992.)

In the first letter of St Peter, we have a simple definition of what Christian stewardship entails. Each one of us is gifted. Each one of us needs to discern our giftedness and be honest in appraising its strength and its weaknesses. For example, I may have the gift of leadership. A wonderful gift! Used well (its strength) it can be a source of support and encouragement of the gifts of others. Used badly (its weakness) it can have a debilitating effect on others where the leadership is about the one who leads and not shared with others whose giftedness is not recognised.

We can explore this direction of St Peter another way - We as Christian stewards; receive God's gifts gratefully, Our gifts are not earned. They are freely bestowed upon us. And we are grateful.

<u>cultivate</u> them <u>responsibly</u>, It is our duty to nurture the gifts we have received. No one selfishly hides a gift (cf. Matthew 25: 24 – 27) but nurtures it to perfection in a responsible manner as steward.

<u>share</u> them <u>lovingly</u> in justice with others. Our gifts are not for ourselves but for others – a gift is not a gift until you give it away, or until it is received – and in love which is the basis of our Faith, we give our gifts to others.

return them with increase to the Lord. In giving to others whom we can see, we give to God the gifts we have nurtured and developed and we will know that we, like the good servants of the parable are worthy of the commendation "well done good and faithful servant!" (Matthew 25: 23)
