ADULT FAITH: The Mass—The Lord's Prayer

It is often said that the *Our Father* (or the *Lord's Prayer* for it was He who taught it to us) is the very model of all prayer and that everything we ought to say to the Father is contained in this collection of simple sentences. However, we need to be conscious that, because it is the Lord's Prayer, there are depths to it that we may not yet have fathomed, for only He could have composed such an appeal to the Father, so simple yet so utterly profound, with so few words yet with such vast horizons. Without having meditated on it in the silence of our private lives, it is virtually impossible to pray it meaningfully at Mass, when it is recited so relatively quickly.

At the heart of Christian revelation, as we know, lies the liberating fact that this God of ours is not hostile to us, as the pagan gods were, but loving beyond measure. In the First Eucharistic Prayer we pray: Be pleased to look upon these offerings with a serene and kindly countenance – that is precisely how we should always think of God, as smiling on us. Our Lord taught us to call God our Father, not my Father, though this individual approach is implied - if God is Father of us all then He is my Father too.

In the context of the Mass, these words, give us this day our daily bread, refer to the Eucharist, the Bread of Heaven. Jesus said to them, "Very truly I tell you... it is my Father who gives you the true bread from heaven. For the bread of God is the bread that comes down from heaven and gives life to the world." "Sir," they said, "always give us this bread." Then Jesus declared, "I am the bread of life" (John 6:34-35).

As baptised Christians, we have become members of *God's household, which is the Church of the living God* (1 Tim 3:14). As we meditate privately on **The Lord's Prayer** the words thy will be done will resonate more profoundly as we recite this prayer as a community – the Body of God - during The Mass. CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP



"As each one has received a gift, use it to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied grace"

1 Pt 4:10

(The following relies heavily on the Pastoral Letter on Stewardship from the UNITED STATES CONFERENCE OF CATHOLIC BISHOPS 1992.)

STEWARDS OF CREATION

God created the world but entrusts it to human beings. Caring for and cultivating the world involves the following:

Joyful appreciation for the God-given beauty and wonder of nature;

None of us can fail to be stirred by the beauty we see around us in such simple things as a sunrise, a sunset, a rain forest, the ocean or the wonder of new life. human, animal or vegetable. We need but to take the time to see, and in seeing, be moved.

Protection and preservation of the environment, which would be the stewardship of ecological concern;

In our own region, we have regular reports of destruction of the environment. We are encouraged, urged to be more environmentally conscious. To name some local examples: The Barrier Reef's life is in jeopardy, the wellbeing of marine life including the turtle population is constantly before us. We can close our eyes and our ears if we wish and see this as none of our concern but if we are good stewards of God's creation, we cannot resile from personal involvement.

Respect for human life—shielding life from threat and assault, doing everything that can be done to enhance this gift and make life flourish;

We have one precious life. It is a gift. From the moment of conception until a body takes its last breath, we cherish life. It is sacred – made in the image of God. As Catholics we celebrate the Sanctity of Life. As stewards of this sacred gift, we are called to stand up against all that threatens and assaults the deep respect in which life should be held. Laws of State may be pragmatic and move with the winds of fancy or expediency but any assault on the sanctity of life in all its stages can never be the butt of expediency.

Development of this world through noble human effort—physical labour, the trades and professions, the arts and sciences. We call such effort "work." Work is a fulfilling human vocation.

In Genesis 3:19 we have mention of the dignity of work for all human beings. There are many references to the work of our hands in the Bible and today in each of our Masses the phrase "work of human hands" comes into the Offertory. Human effort is needed for the ongoing development of this world. Work is a noble vocation. The recent Feast of St Joseph the Worker is a clear statement from the Church of this. It makes all who work cocreators of this developing world.

Live the Liturgy

If you had to summarize the essential core of the Christian life, what would it be? Mercy, truth, or love, perhaps? The readings today suggest another word which may surprise you. That word is *priesthood*.

St. Peter says to us, "You are a 'chosen race, a royal priesthood..." To be part of a priesthood is to offer a particular sacrifice in order for the community to survive and thrive. Jesus is the great high priest because he offers the one perfect sacrifice which heals and perfects the entire human race. Peter the Apostle wants us to know that all the baptized share in this priestly ministry. The whole of our lives, including every detail, is meant to become our acceptable offering to God.

The baptized exercise this priesthood in many ways, I'll mention three. At Sunday Mass, in private prayer, and in daily work. At Mass, we offer the sacrifice of our lives with that of the priest, who symbolizes Christ the Priest. In our prayer, a "morning offering" prayer is a great way to offer up all the joys and sufferings of the day to come. In our daily work, we sacrifice our time, comfort, money, and energy to do good for others. All this gives the deepest possible meaning to our lives: we share in the priesthood which saves the world. That's at the core of our faith.
