#### **FOCUS by Alana Clarke**

Over the School Holidays, we took a group of seventeen (17) people (including fourteen (14) of our Youth) to the Ignite Conference in Brisbane. The Ignite Conference is a Catholic Youth gathering held every year, where around fifteen hundred (1500) people gather to praise and discover God together.



In the weeks leading up to Ignite, there was a lot of excitement from the Youth of Bundaberg. We encouraged the Youth to have open minds and open hearts to everything they may hear and experience during the Conference. As a Team, between running the Year 7 & 8 Keynotes, running Workshops, and doing other volunteer jobs, we took every spare opportunity to meet up with the Group and listen to and share in their experiences. What a privilege it was to be able to journey with them over the four (4) days, to see lives transformed and to hear about their different encounters with Jesus. To see our young people excited, about Adoration in particular, joyful in receiving Reconciliation, enthusiastic in attending Mass and praising God in new ways made my heart so happy

We heard from some amazing speakers such as Sr. Hilda Scott, Fr. Rob Galea and Karl Brown from Ignite Youth Perth. They all spoke so much truth on opening our hearts to Jesus and growing in relationship with Him.

One of my highlights was from the Friday night rally, when Adoration was held; I watched from the top balcony as so many young people gathered around the Monstrance, all adoring Jesus together. It was such a special night that not only I will hold forever in my heart, but I know so many others will too. Overall, the Ignite Conference was an amazing and life changing experience for many, and it makes me happy to see the Youth of Bundaberg excited to talk about their time there, especially on how Jesus is working in them.

#### LITURGY SPOT

THE EUCHARISTIC PRAYER is an invitation to praise, thank and bless our God. It is the centre and summit of our entire celebration. Is that the way we see it? Do we regard it as so long that we tend to "drift off" in the middle? It is not "Father's prayer" but a presidential prayer, that is, led by the priest. It requires the participation of all present because it is a DIALOGUE between God and the assembly, the priest and the assembly.

This week we recognise the importance of families, health care professionals, carers and friends who support persons with mental illnesses. We acknowledge their role in care giving, for their continuing search of information and of their emotional needs. Thank you for your constant love and care.

# Jubilee of Mercy Merciful like the Father

#### Corporal & Spiritual Works of Mercy Instruct the Ignorant

This is a work we perform often; whether we do it as a work of mercy is another matter. It might be helpful to give this work a different name: share the good news. We are not called to impart information, but to "make a defense to anyone who calls you to account for the hope that is in you, yet do it with gentleness and reverence" (1 Pt 3:15). We are to share with others the heart of the Gospel, which Pope Francis describes in this way: "In this basic core, what shines forth is the beauty of the saving love of God made manifest in Jesus Christ who died and rose from the dead" (Evangelium gaudii 36).

We cannot share what we do not have. This work of mercy obliges us to deepen our knowledge of and love for our Catholic faith. We are challenged to give what Blessed John Henry Newman called "real assent" to our beliefs. He contrasted this with what he called "notional assent." The difference is that notional assent to truth is merely informational, whereas real assent is something that changes our entire life. It is when we see the Creed, the liturgy, the commandments, and the spiritual life as so many expressions of a deep personal relationship with Jesus that they come alive. We have a rich patrimony of faith in the Catholic Church, but without this essential personal relationship it is nothing more than a cultural inheritance. Thus to carry out this work we need to deepen our own knowledge in a way that nurtures our union with God. There are educational opportunities offered in our diocese and parishes, and if time allows we should take advantage of them. (Like the Jubilee of Mercy Enrichment Series, the Saint Francis de Sales School for Pastoral Ministry and the Serra Catechetical Institute).

We can also explore the faith on our own, by a prayerful reading of the Scriptures with a useful commentary, studying the Catechism of the Catholic Church, and prayerfully reading over the prayers of the liturgy.

The best instruction comes from example. We are told at the beginning of the Acts of the Apostles that St. Luke dealt in his gospel "with all that Jesus began to do and teach" (Acts 1:1). It is noteworthy that Jesus first did, and only then taught. If people see that our faith makes a difference in the way we live our daily lives - how we treat people, how we deal with setbacks and difficulties, and how we set our priorities - they may want to learn more about it.

We live in a culture that is very secular, in which there is growing hostility to religion in general and to the Catholic Church in particular. It is incumbent on us to be able to answer criticisms, but always,

as St. Peter says, "with gentleness and reverence". We should look on every conversation as an opportunity to draw others closer to God and to "the truth that sets us free" (see Jn 8:32). Our society is increasingly polarized and there seems to be more and more hostility and verbal aggression; "civil discourse" is becoming rare. If we are deeply rooted in our faith and knowledgeable about it, we will not be insecure. There should be a kind of serenity and meekness in the way we share what we believe. It should be good as well as news; a truth that really sets people free.



For you created me and shaped me, gave me life within my mother's womb. For the wonder of who I am, I praise you: safe in your hands, all creation is made new.

This service is for women and men who have suffered loss a baby, as well as for their children and their extended family and friends, whether the loss be recent or historic.

All are welcome regardless of the type of loss they have experienced, whether they have been through miscarriage, abortion, still birth, early infant loss or any type of baby or child

If you need to say goodbye to a baby or to grief, or you want to come along with a friend who needs to say goodbye, you are welcome.

Loss at any stage is traumatic. Early loss is often not acknowledged or discussed, with commemorative services seldom taking place, whilst services for babies who are stillborn or lost in early years, are usually conducted while parents are in a fog of grief and pain.

This service will give you the opportunity to stand with other people 'who know' the pain of losing a child, and acknowledge and remember your lost children.


