FOCUS by Fr John Daly

It was a terrible shock to be told last Saturday that Fr Bruce Little had died the night before. He was travelling on a journey of a life time, holidaying for three(3) months. That journey ended within two (2) days of leaving the Port of Brisbane.

He has now travelled another unplanned journey into eternal life - a life with our compassionate ever embracing God. At some time in the future each of us will have to make that journey into God.

Last Wednesday we began our Lenten Journey. This Journey prepares us both for Easter and for the ultimate Easter Rising we call "Eternal Life".

Through our prayers, penance and works of love and mercy we journey with Christ to become a people better living the Gospel.

LITURGY

Catholics have a rich understanding of fasting that goes beyond the notion of simply giving up food. In our Lenten liturgy we ritually experience this fasting. For forty days we do without the proclamation of 'Alleluia' before the Gospel. The absence of this Easter word reminds us that we are immersing ourselves into a season of fasting. In the same way we also fast from singing the Gloria. Even our liturgical space is devoid of any decoration.

STEWARDSHIP

With the Passion being the focus of Lent, it is easy to contemplate the value of true generosity. How could someone give more than Jesus? He gave until his life was spent on a cross. When contemplating how we can increase our generosity in all aspects of our life, we only need to look to the cross. Of course, this also brings home to us that more may be asked of us than we bargained. The temptation is to not give too much, out of fear that we might face persecution or worse.

But we take solace in the fact that we are disciples of One who had the same temptations. He overcame those temptations. He rejected the easy way out. His love and generosity could not be contained. He gave it all so that you and I have the chance to do the same. This Lent, look to the greatest example of stewardship that ever lived. Jesus will show us the way to observe a Lent that will soon bring forth great Easter fruit.



SCRIPTURE REFLECT & RESPOND


Matthew 4:1-11

In his responses to the temptation of the devil, Jesus quotes from the Book of Deuteronomy and Psalms. How does sacred Scripture guide you in times of distress?

Genesis 2:7-9; 3:1-7 What does this excerpt from the creation story of Adam and Eve teach us about the nature of evil?

Romans 5:12-19

In his letter to the Christians in Rome, Paul juxtaposes the disobedience of Adam with the obedience of Christ. During this season of Lent, how can you confront this tension in your spiritual life?

SCRIPTURAL REFLECTION

The lessons of the Scriptures are conveyed, for the most part, through stories. Today's readings bring us two outstanding stories of this kind: the story of the temptation of Adam and Eve, and the story of the temptations of Jesus, the 'New Adam', as he takes up his mission after his baptism in the Jordan.

Writing for his community of Jewish converts, Matthew tells the story of the temptations of Jesus in a way that echoes themes of the traditions familiar to them: his temptation 'in the wilderness' calls to mind the trials that led the people of the Exodus, during their forty years wandering in the desert, to lose their trust in the Lord; like Moses, at Mount Sinai, Jesus fasts for 'forty days'; Jesus finds the strength to overcome his temptations by living according to the words of the Scriptures.

This carefully crafted story refers to more than a single episode in the life of the Saviour. It gives us an insight into the ongoing human experience of Jesus who, in the wonder of the Incarnation, shared our human condition and its struggles - even its temptations, though he was 'without sin' (Heb 4:15). The temptations of Jesus are set forth as an encouragement for us. As we give direction and meaning to our lives, we are tempted to seek security in false gods (Col 3:5): pleasure and possessions; the exercise of power; the achievement of recognition and status. The Saviour's temptations have often been linked with these false securities. As, in his hunger, he rejects the consolation of miraculous food, Jesus encourages us to recognise the empty promise of pleasure and possessions, and to find our security in the truths of our Christian faith. As he turns his back on the earthly triumph many of his contemporaries associated with the coming of Israel's messiah, he invites us to see that a selfish exercise of power over others leads only to bitterness. As he refuses to turn aside from his mission to express the ways of his Father, by becoming involved in the politics of 'the kingdoms of the world', he points out to us the way that leads to the true peace yearned for by the peoples of the world.

In today's second reading — a text much discussed in recent scholarship — St Paul compares the Saviour, whom elsewhere he calls 'the final Adam' (1 Cor 15:45), with the Adam of the Genesis story. The point he wants to make is the incomparable greatness of the Saviour and the blessings he brings in the story of humanity — brought out in a comparison with the Adam figure of the Scriptures. He is not concerned to interpret the complex significance of that figure.

The gospels speak of the temptations of Jesus immediately after his baptism and the Father's words of encouragement as he come from the waters. We may see here a concern in the community that gave us the gospels, to prepare those receiving baptism for the temptations that they will certainly face as they live their lives as disciples of the Lord.
