FOCUS by Denise Tuzes

On Friday the 9th February we were blessed by the visit to our parish by Sr Melissa Dwyer, a Canossian daughter of charity. Sr Mel shared with us some of her personal journey with God and in particular her time as Head Mistress of a girl's school in Malawi where 650 girls boarded. Malawi is the poorest country in the world and education and health care nearly non-existent hence her involvement in teaching.

The second half of her presentation was to help us prepare for and participate in the journey of Lent. She gave us a recipe for Lent:

- 1: Prayer-----and again prayer
- 2: Giving up ----- and taking up
- 3: Be a person of gratitude------ what is one thing I have been grateful for today.
- 4: Strive to be extraordinary
- 5: Try something new this Lent
- 6: Allow ourselves to be disturbed by God
- 7: Be credible and consistent
- 8: There is Resurrection.

She also shared three points for us to consider.

1: The challenge as followers of Jesus is to let our relationship with Him take flesh in our lives. To live the words we say.

2: Do not be afraid. Do not be satisfied with mediocrity. Put out into the deep and let down your nets for a catch.

3: Don't stay in the boat when God is calling you to step out on the water.

Her presentation was very warmly received by 70 people and an inspiration for us on our Lenten journeys.

Janaki is a young entrepreneur from Nepal, who has turned her life around. Growing up in a world of poverty and disadvantage, coupled with a forced marriage at the age of twelve, she was in a very vulnerable position. Even more so when her husband



died just two years into their marriage. She's now running her own successful sewing business and has become an inspirational community leader.

In 2015, Janaki joined a youth club formed by Caritas Australia partners, Caritas Nepal and the Ekata Foundation Surkhet, as part of the Children and Youth Empowerment Program (CYEP) which provides youth with job skills and income-generating projects. She took a loan from the youth club to purchase her first sewing machine.

Two years on, Janaki has 11 sewing machines and is running her own business, teaching others and is considered a community role model. "My confidence level has raised," Janaki says. "I appreciate all those respected peoples of Australia who are supporting this wise cause. Through their help, women who experience domestic violence and who are financially vulnerable are getting new hope in their life. I thank them from bottom of my heart."

LIVE THE LITURGY

The RCIA Rite of Election is celebrated on the first Sunday of Lent for those preparing for the Easter sacraments. The usual place of celebration is the cathedral with the Bishop. This rite marks the beginning of a more intense period of preparation by the candidates. At this stage in their journey the catechumens, along with their sponsors and catechists, are asked to discern their readiness for initiation. Kristy-Lee Anderson and her daughter, Atlanta, travelled to Rockhampton, while Julie Price celebrated the Rite during the 5.30pm Mass.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

When we are fully in the world it is hard to get past the busyness and constant noise of modern existence. First Reading


The story of Noah and the Ark informs us of the covenant God established with Noah never again to allow such a world-wide devastating flood. What does this divine promise tell us about God?

GOSPEL REFELCTION

Why do we always go to the desert? We see this example in Scripture time and time again. The Israelites wandered in the desert. King David and prophets were driven into the wilderness. And now Jesus is in the same place. Lent after Lent, we too are invited into a barren, desolate place. Why do we always go to the desert?

Throughout Scripture, the desert is a place of testing. It's also a place of hiding and withdrawal. In the Old Testament, David fled into the wilderness to hide from Saul, Elijah from Jezebel, and Jonah from God! In other words, the desert is a place of "retreat." In Christian circles, we use the word to describe a spiritual weekend away. But its meaning comes from warfare, as we well know. To retreat means to draw back, to separate oneself from the fighting. Of course, a military retreat brings its own kind of "battle" - the internal assessment of why the fighting went so poorly.

As we enter into this Lenten season, we are invited to retreat into the desert with Jesus. Attending a day or weekend of reflection is a wonderful spiritual practice. This "desert spirituality," however, can fill all forty days. We can fulfill our Lenten resolutions with a purpose - writing daily notes to family and friends can inspire new gratitude, every time we pass up that specific food item can be cause for intercession for deeper sufferings and privations of others.

The Gospel tells us that "the Spirit drove him out into the desert." In other words, God wants us to be here. What feels uncomfortable is actually part of our spiritual journey. To be stretched, to be challenged, to confront our own areas of weakness - these things are essential in our walk with God. This Lent, will you go to the desert?
