

FOCUS by Anne Sheehan

HOLY WEEK, from Palm Sunday, next weekend, to the Easter Triduum, stands at the heart of the Church's year. Palm Sunday celebrates Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem for the Jewish festival of Passover. We read an account of the Passion of Christ as the Gospel; hence this is sometimes called Passion Sunday.

"In the Sacred Triduum, the Church solemnly celebrates the greatest mysteries of our redemption, keeping by means of special celebration the memorial of her Lord, crucified, buried and risen." (Roman Missal,p329). The Easter Triduum is a rich and inspiring celebration of the Church's Liturgy that is spread over three days but is really one unified celebration. It begins on Holy Thursday with the Mass of the Lord's Supper and concludes with the Easter Vigil, the "mother of all vigils", on Holy Saturday night. "The Easter triduum begins with the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper, reaches its high point in the Easter Vigil, and closes with Evening Prayer on Easter Sunday. On Good Friday and, if possible, also on Holy Saturday until the Easter Vigil, the Easter fast is observed everywhere." (General Norms for the Liturgical Year#19,20)

The Easter Vigil is the night when the Elect who have been preparing for a long time for initiation are baptised and welcomed to the table of the Lord. This is a night for celebration and all the baptised come together in union of our faith in the Risen Jesus. All are encouraged to be present to welcome Julie Price, Kristy-Lee Anderson, Atlanta Caruana, Taj & Levi Axford, Kai Todd and Natalie Horwood through the waters of baptism.

Ditosa is a young girl from Mozambique who hopes to go to university and become a police officer. Featured in Project Compassion 2013, Ditosa faced a challenging future with food scarcity, little education and few job prospects. Cared for by her grandmother and aunt, after her parents died of



AIDS-related illnesses, they also lost their home and livelihoods in severe flooding.

Thanks to the support of Project Compassion, Caritas Australia and Caritas Regional Chokwe (CRC) helped Ditosa's family to build a new house and assisted with transport fees, school materials and fees, to help Ditosa to stay at school. Ditosa attended the Matuba Children's Centre daily (set up by Caritas in 2007) which provides vulnerable children, like Ditosa, with lunch, study help, and computer and income-generating skills training.

In 2018, Ditosa has graduated from school and is ambitious for the future. "Without the support of the people from Australia and Caritas I would not have been given this opportunity to continue my schooling." Ditosa dreams of going to university to continue studying and secure an even brighter future.

LIVETHE LITURGY

SCRIPTURE REFLECT & RESPOND

First Reading

Around 600 BC, just prior to Israel's exile into Babylon, the prophet Jeremiah spoke of a "new covenant" that God would establish for his people. According to Jeremiah, what makes this covenant unique from past covenants?

Second Reading

Hebrews tells us that Jesus "learned obedience from what he suffered." What has the suffering in your life taught you?

Gospel Reading

Jesus speaks about being "troubled" for his "hour" has come (a reference to his impending suffering and death). What does this struggle tell us about Jesus?

GOSPEL REFELCTION

"Now there were some Greeks among those who had come to worship at the feast. They came to Philip and asked him, 'Sir, we would like to see Jesus.'" It has begun. News of Jesus has spread beyond native-born, Aramaic-speaking Jews. We don't know if the Greeks mentioned here heard of Jesus from fellow travellers or if news of this intriguing rabbi had reached all the way to their home. What we do know is that this interaction spurred an interesting comment from Jesus: "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified." In other words, it has begun. The time has come for the message to move beyond the geographic bounds of Israel.

But what does this message require? The Gospel is clear: "he said this indicating the kind of death he would die." A grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies to its life as only a seed. A caterpillar takes on the appearance of temporary death in order to transform into a butterfly. In the Gospels, sacrifice and death are a way of becoming something more than you were before.

This Lent, new life can come from our sacrifices. When we enter into the season with Jesus, our difficulties can transform our perspective. "Unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit."

As we abstain from meat and fast from eating between meals, we can grow in compassion for the hungry. We can give alms of our time, sacrificially spending time with the lonely, the sick, and the marginalized. Our little Lenten "deaths" - death to unnecessary preferences, death to selfish living, death to ignorance of other's pain can bring new life to the world long after the season is over. This is the invitation this Sunday and every Lenten season, to begin anew from death to life.
