When Psyche Mae featured in Project Compassion 2008, she was living in a squatter settlement, on the edge of a giant rubbish dump outside Manila in the Philippines. Her family was forced to pick through the rubbish to sell what they could to survive.



In 2018, Psyche Mae is now a young social worker,

achieving her dream of helping others struggling to leave poverty behind them – with plans to study a Master's degree. Thanks to the support of individuals and Caritas Australia through Project Compassion, the Faithful Companions of Jesus (FCJ) program helps people like Psyche Mae to learn job and income generating skills, encourages education, addresses health and runs programs that enable members to save money and take out small, low interest loans. It's estimated around 5000 people are assisted directly or indirectly by this program.

Psyche Mae's mother has also become a part-time sewing teacher, her father works with the House Repair program, both run by FCJ and her three brothers and sisters are studying hard. With their jobs and the help of a community savings plan – Psyche Mae's entire family managed to lift themselves out of poverty and build a just future

LIVETHE LITURGY

Today some of the most poignant themes of human life come into clear central focus: the feeling of being praised and honored, fear, anxiety, betrayal, despair, doubt, uncertainty, trust, hope, sadness, separation, suffering, death, determination, and courage. These are the emotions and realities that every human being wrestles with often. Jesus, the Son of God, encounters them all. As we journey through life, we have to confront the existential meaning of each of these things. How do they fit into the bigger picture? Jesus shows us most clearly that even those things we fear the most lose their power when we discover that we are being led to new life. Suffering is redemptive. Sin and death give way to grace and life and God's unconditional love conquers all. May we see in Jesus' Way of the Cross the path of truth we all must follow.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

How far would you go to give of yourself so that another might live? Would you have to love him or her like your own child or parent? No one can deny it would be a difficult decision, especially if your giving put your own health at risk.

Reflecting on these things helps to provide some perspective on the crucifixion of Jesus. Not only did he suffer tremendously at the hands of the Romans, he gave his life for us so we might live forever. What does true stewardship look like? The cross is a symbol to us of total surrender. When we are called to give of ourselves in ordinary ways in daily life we sometimes hesitate and think twice. Perhaps when we are unsure we should look to the cross and there we can find our strength. And then when the call comes to truly sacrifice and place our trust in God, we may have already developed a lifestyle that makes responding, "yes," that much easier.-

Good Friday - Day of Fasting & Abstinence

Abstinence: Those who are over 14 years of age are bound by the law of abstinence. No meat may be eaten on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Fasting: Those who have completed their eighteenth year are bound by the law of fasting until their sixtieth year. Fasting means having only one full meal to maintain one's strength. Two smaller, meatless and penitential meals are permitted according to one's needs.

Holy Father's Good Friday Collection for the Holy Land:

A collection will be taken up on Good Friday with proceeds going to support hospitals, clinics, schools, and community centres in the Holy Land.

RCIA Happenings: Next Saturday morning our Elect will celebrate the **Preparatory Rites of Holy Saturday** surrounded by their godparents and catechists. This is a time for reflection and prayer, and some of the minor rites may be celebrated as an immediate preparation for the Easter sacraments: the presentation of the Creed and Lord's Prayer, the recitation of the Creed, the ephphetha rite and the anointing with the oil of catechumens. (RCIA 172.2).

Easter Vigil Mass: Celebrations begin **outside the church around the Easter fire.** All except those who are physically unable to do so, are asked to gather on the school oval to begin the Service of Light. The church will be in darkness.

Holy Water for the Home: During the Easter Vigil, water is blessed for the Easter baptisms, and baptisms during the Easter season, for the water fonts at church doors and for those who wish to have some holy water at home. Small plastic bottles will be available after the Vigil

GOSPEL REFELCTION

Our humanity bleeds through today's Gospel passages in more ways than one. We see both elation and fall, hope in the midst of the darker sides of our natures. If we allow it, these Gospels hold a mirror to our own fickle hearts. The crowds cry "Hosanna" and the Apostles profess allegiance unto death. In a manner of days - even hours - Jesus is betrayed, abandoned, denied, condemned, tortured, and executed. As God, he could have stopped this horrific narrative from unfolding, but he doesn't. He allows free will to play itself out.

There are nearly two millennia between this spectacle and us. We can stand safely removed, if we choose. But Lent invites us to return to this story. Lent invites us to find ourselves in the people we encounter there. Are we the repentant woman at Bethany? Are we naysayers of such lavish piety? Have we acted in a way that betrays those we love or denies what we know to be good and true? Have we fallen asleep in our faith? Have we unfairly accused others of a crime or immorality we imagine, though perhaps they didn't commit? Do we help others carry their burdens? Do we stand in solidarity with those who suffer? Do we care for the dying?

This week, take up today's Gospel again. Look carefully at the Passion narrative and sit with it in silence. Find yourself in the story and ponder its meaning for your own life. Journey with Jesus to the foot of the Cross so that you too may say, along with the faithful centurion, "truly this man was the Son of God!"
