FOCUS by Denise Tuzes

I would like to share an article I recently read written by Fr. Mark De Battista.

Our Lord warns his Disciples to pray in a different manner to the pagans who believed that the more words one used, the more likely their petition would be heard by the deity. Yet, having warned about using too many words, Our Lord goes on to provide them with words of his own.

But, if our Heavenly Father already knows our prayers before we ask him, then why do we need to pray at all? The answer to this question lies in the truth that when we pray we present nothing new to God, but, we often discover something new in ourselves. Whenever we pray, we put into human words, what we had only previously felt unconsciously, or subconsciously ---- at best. The action of prayer is an act of surrender to God which causes us to become aware of hidden things within.

Thus, prayer becomes a means to growth in self-knowledge. Through prayer we come to recognise our needs, our wishes and deepest desires. We come to recognise our hurts and disappointments. We come to feel our lack of forgiveness of others and even our own failure to accept the very forgiveness of God by considering ourselves to be unforgivable.

LIVE THE LITURGY

We are called to be missionaries. Jesus said to his disciples: "Go into the whole world and proclaim the gospel to every creature." Proclaiming the Gospel means looking out at my brothers and sisters and choosing to walk with them on their journey of life. It means having a listening, loving presence that allows the Holy Spirit to work in and through us. In this way we can show them-not only in speech, but in action-the difference a relationship with God and a life of faith really makes. Even though Jesus has ascended to the Father, he still remains with us helping us proclaim the mission of the Gospel. Are we willing to allow him to do so?

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

Recognize God in Your Ordinary Moments

We are told in Scripture that in the early Church, as the first disciples went about preaching the Good News, their words were confirmed by "accompanying signs." Miracles such as healings, prophecies, and the like occurred so that others might see and believe. SCRIPTURE REFLECT & RESPOND

Acts 1:1-11


The opening scene to the Acts of the Apostles is the ascension of Jesus into heaven with Jesus' departing words to the Disciples. How well have you responded to Jesus' command to evangelize others?

Ephesians 4:1-13

Paul tells the Ephesians, "Grace was given to each of us according to the measure of Christ's gift." Where do you see God's grace in your life?

John 16:15-20

The final episode in the Gospel of Mark is the ascension of Jesus. What do you find most interesting in Mark's account of the ascension?



PARISH MISSION STATEMENT In relationship with Christ, empowered by the Holy Spirit, we serve joyfully as a people beloved and called by God.

GOSPEL REFELCTION

From the moment of his resurrection triumph, the Saviour was living in the bosom of the Father. The faith of the Church had its beginnings in meetings with the Risen Lord - in which he 'showed himself alive' and 'told them about the kingdom of God' - preparing them for the great mission that would be theirs. Today's celebration reminds us that these meetings finally came to an end - after 'forty days', as Luke puts it in our reading from Acts. Luke is preparing us for what will occur after 'not many days': at the Pentecostal celebration, fifty days after the Passover.

Jesus is not abandoning his friends. On the contrary, he tells them to look forward to 'what the Father has promised'. When they are 'baptised with the Holy Spirit' – the Spirit who is the very expression of the life he shares with the Father – he will be with them in all that they are called to be and do. The Lord's new presence will fill with new life the Church which is about to be launched forth on its mission - to bring the power and blessings of the Lord's Paschal Mystery 'to the ends of the earth' (Luke), 'to all creation' (Mark).

According to the Gospel of Luke the angels tell the disciples not to seek the Lord 'in the sky', but to take up the mission they have received, to be his 'witnesses' throughout their world. The era of the pilgrim Church that is about to begin – the angels tell them will end when Jesus returns, and the Church's life in faith and sacraments gives way to the absolute fulfilment of the final Kingdom.

Our readings describe the task of the Church as it journeys through history towards the final Kingdom, bringing the 'Good News to all creation'. Its life together - in the power of the Resurrection - should be a living sign, confirming the message it brings. 'Charity, selflessness, gentleness and patience' should be an expression of the 'unity of the Spirit' – the unity which only God can give, the unity of the 'one Body' of Christ, the unity of those who know that they are called together by the 'one God who is Father of all'.

United, through their 'baptism', in the blessings of the Paschal Mystery, Church members should share the many gifts they receive from 'the one who rose higher than all the heavens to fill all things'. Doing so they will show their world the pattern of authentic human fulfilment, in 'the fullness of Christ'.

On Ascension Day we celebrate our Christian hope - where Jesus, our brother and our Lord has gone we shall follow. The pilgrim Church must bring to our struggling world the Good News that, through his Paschal Mystery, the Saviour calls the whole of the human family to live forever with him in the bosom of the Father.
