At the start of my service to the Parish on Monday 28 May 2018, I read the document "Integrity in the Service of the Church". The Introduction states "The service of Church Workers has its origins in the Gospel and in particular in Jesus' statement that he had come that all might have life, 'Life in all its fullness'. (John 10:10). The principles and standards put forward in this document are extensions of five basic principles for Church Workers... Service, given according to these principles, is life-enriching for both providers and recipients."

I'm very pleased to be working as your Parish Business Manager knowing these values are aspired to by all parties. I hit the ground running, with over 20 items immediately on my "To Do" list, and it's comforting to know that, even with the many pressures this job will bring, my business dealings can be "life-enriching" to all involved.

Our Parish was very fortunate to recently receive a substantial bequest, and it is from this capital reserve that we can fund the installation costs of the projection equipment. Planned Giving funds need not be used.

Once again, with the aim of open and transparent communication, Fr. Peter and I will be available after next weekend's Masses at St. Mary's, St. Patrick's and St. James' churches to discuss the proposed installation of the projectors and screens. We encourage your feedback, and we look

forward to discussing this important matter

with you then.

I have coached all three of my children in soccer at some time in their lives. I loved teaching them and their teammates the importance of functioning as one unit. If we were not all moving together toward victory, we would all find ourselves together in defeat. We used to go through one drill I called the "human foosball." We would scrimmage with players in lines like on a foosball table. If you ever got too far behind or too far ahead of those in your line, play would stop and the ball would go to the other team. The goal was to help build an awareness of where your teammates were on the pitch and to teach the lesson that no one player is a team onto themselves.

As disciples and stewards, we sometimes find ourselves far behind or maybe even too far ahead. As a consequence, our actions either hinder the ability of the Body of Christ to evangelize and pass on the faith to a new generation or present the Church as an entity that sees itself as judgmental or too holy to be in the world. We are called to community, and in that community, we must be aware of our brothers and sisters in the faith. At times, we need to help them grow in their faith. Other times, we need to slow down and realize that we cannot change the world on our own. We all have unique gifts we are called to share, and we can only bear true witness to the power of the Body of Christ when we are all moving together and making each other strong.

SCRIPTURE REFLECT & RESPOND

Genesis 3:9-15

We hear today part of the divine consequences of Adam and Eve disobeying God -- eternal enmity (hostility, hatred) between the serpent and humanity. Where do you see this enmity in the world today?

2 Corinthians 4:13 - 5:1

In his second letter to the Christians in Corinth, Paul writes with confidence that as a believer in Christ, he will be raised with Christ. Are there people in your life with a similar conviction of faith?

Mark 3:20-35

Why do you think the scribes from Jerusalem attributed evil intent ("He is possessed by Beelzebul.") behind Jesus' power to heal people and exorcise demons?

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Situating today's gospel reading in Mark's ongoing narrative can help us understand how Mark puts incidents together to convey the drama of the public life of Jesus. Its beginning in Galilee leaves us in no doubt that Jesus caused quite a stir: he taught with authority; crowds gathered where he was staying; he healed the sick and pronounced the forgiveness of sins; and he began to meet opposition. We are reminded of Mark's sub-text: Who is this man? In today's reading, that question confronts Jesus in two very different forms.

The reaction of the family of Jesus gives us a moving glimpse of his situation after leaving home and becoming a vagabond preacher. Following a very traditional way of life, his family were understandably concerned at what they heard, fearing that Jesus may have become unbalanced. But the mission Jesus is initiating aims to open up a world far beyond human loyalties and expectations. As the months that are follow will show, his teaching, his miracles, and the final witness of his death, are all undertaken to inaugurate nothing less than the new family of God, which he called 'the Kingdom'. This incident also helps us to know Mary, the courageous woman who is our model as she makes the journey of life in the darkness of faith. Several times the Gospels remember Mary 'pondering', 'wondering at what has been said', trusting in 'whatever he says to do'. Jesus' departure from the family home would not have been without pain and anxiety for her. Here we see her seeking to understand her son's mysterious mission along with the troubled family. Though it is not something that Mark adverts to as he recalls this moment, Mary is surely the greatest of all those who 'do the will of God'.

The scribes brought a very different challenge. Their vicious attack seems to be an expression of frustration, such as would be expected later in Jesus' ministry — perhaps it is introduced here to underline the sub-text, that we should take with us as we set out to follow Mark's gospel story, Who is this man? Jesus found it easy to point out the inconsistency of his frustrated adversaries' accusation that he is an agent of 'the Prince of demons'. However, what are we to make of the declaration that 'a blasphemy against the Holy Spirit will never be forgiven'? Christian faith tells us that there is no possible sin that is beyond the forgiveness of God. The meaning of Jesus teaching is simple enough: Those who, like these scribes, choose to be blind to the working of the Holy Spirit can never find forgiveness so long as they choose not to be open to God's truth.
