FOCUS by Fr John Daly

During this period between Easter and Pentecost our Scripture Readings are from John's Gospel (The Gospel of the Beloved Disciple), The Acts of the Apostles (an account of how the early Church began and developed) and The Book of the Apocalypse (the hope of what is to come). The Feast of the Ascension is an exception in that, it uses Luke's Gospel and the Book of Hebrews.

Our readings at this time speak of the essential virtues: faith, hope and love. Under the guidance of the Holy Spirit the early Christian Community is identified by these three ways of living. So much so that St Paul in his writings can say "Three things only last: faith, hope and love; and the greatest of these is love." (1 Corinthian 13:13)

That being the case, it makes sense that we as individuals and as a community of disciples build up these virtues while we have a chance. This period between Easter and Pentecost is about firming up our Baptismal vocation: to be covered in Christ; to live His life. It is a good time to look at our faith, hope and love. Am I attempting to live these virtues more fully? Can people look at our community, our parish and say "They are a community of believers where hope has a home and love is evident"?

Our Gospels and The Acts of the Apostles certainly stress the witness of love. "By this love you have for one another, everyone will know that you are my disciples." (John 13:55 - Fifth Sunday of Easter)

Love has many faces. It is seen in the way people encourage one another; in the manner in which we speak to and of others; in our attitude to differences and so on. I saw a news item during the week where the Mayor and community leaders from Binalonan, a town north of Manila in the Philippines have placed a ban on gossip. Gossip had become so diverse that now there is in place an anti-gossip group ordinance. For gossip one can receive a fine and then pick up rubbish around the town. While it seems sad that a law has to come into place for such a thing, it does emphasise the damage gossip causes and what an act of disrespect and lacking in love it is.

There are so many ways we can fail to love or witness to love as a parish community! In this Easter Season, let us in faith live in a more loving way. It is the only way to hold back the growing hatred and intolerance that seems to be spreading throughout the world.

Let us be guided by our Easter Scriptures. To discover what true love is we may reflect on St Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians, "Love is...." (1 Corinthian 13:4-13) or look to the fruits of the Spirit as listed by St Paul in his Letter to the Galatians, "What the Spirit brings is very different: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, trustfulness, gentleness and self-control." (Galatians 5:22)

To have these in our lives and in our community is to witness in faith, hope and love the life of the Risen Christ.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

I am struck by how Jesus addresses the disciples in the 21st chapter of John. They have been fishing all night, and when the dawn comes, Jesus asks, "Children, have you caught anything to eat?" They hadn't caught a thing, so he tells them what to do to finally fill their nets. These children thought they knew best, but they couldn't get the job done until they listened to Jesus. Like a child who needs a parent, these early followers of Jesus were learning that real maturity of faith requires trusting in and listening to the Teacher.

The stewardship way of life demands of us a certain maturity of discipleship. Just as a child is not yet ready to be a parent, an immature disciple may not yet be ready to sacrifice regardless of the cost or understand the true value of his generosity. So every day, we are challenged and called to respond, sometimes even with little cost to ourselves. But each step, no matter how small, brings with it growth. We are growing not only in maturity, but in the ability to trust in God and how to listen for the call as well.

How mature are you in your faith? How much trust do you have in Jesus Christ? How often do you pause to listen to the instructions of your Teacher? The night is now over, and the dawn is upon you. Reflect on the visible fruit of your stewardship, and then listen for the words of Jesus.



What does John's vision reveal to us about the unseen order?


John 21:1-19

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GOSPEL REFLECTION

"Simon Peter said to them, 'I am going fishing."" Peter is a favourite apostle for many people. I wonder if it is because of his flawed, relatable humanity. Today's Gospel takes place after Jesus appears to the disciples and breathes the Holy Spirit upon them. And yet, Peter finds himself returning to his old way of life, to comfortable habits he formed long before following Jesus. Is something still lingering in him? Is something still lingering in us? Lent is over, and we should be rejoicing! But do you feel like you're still holding onto something? Or perhaps you had an excellent Lent. You encountered Jesus in a new way and grew in faith. But as the weeks since Easter have slipped by, some of your newfound devotion has begun to waver. The closeness you felt in your Lenten commitments has given way to humdrum status quo or turn-of-the-season busyness.

"'Simon, son of John, do you love me?" Peter has endured so much in his walk of discipleship! But something is still weighing on him. In today's Gospel, Jesus confirms Peter's devotion three times, a redemption of his earlier threefold denial. The call of the Lord must come again, as if heard anew for the first time. So often, this is the pattern of the Christian life. We discover God and experience a new desire for our faith, but in time, our enthusiasm begins to wane. Perhaps something happens that startles us, or we startle ourselves by a poor decision. Then we discover God anew! Our joy returns...for a while. Even the Apostles were no strangers to the cyclical nature of spiritual growth. Our disappointments or frustrations should not be cause for giving up. Like Peter, we too can recommit and start anew. This Sunday and every day of our lives, Jesus is waiting to say again, "Follow me."
