PENTECOST

Pentecost comes from the Greek work (*Pentēkostē*) meaning "fiftieth". It comes fifty days after the Passover and is also referred to as the Festival of Weeks in Judaism. It was a harvest festival, an important day in the Hebrew calendar. This Jewish festival took on a new significance for the young Christian church by the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the apostles as they gathered to celebrate the Pentecost festival. This Pentecost which was fifty days after the Resurrection of Jesus would change the apostles' lives forever, so much so that Pentecost is sometimes referred to as "the birthday of the Church".

The Easter season concludes on Pentecost Sunday. It has been fifty days since Resurrection Sunday. For fifty days we have been reminded of our baptismal call to discipleship. We have been blessed by water each Sunday as the song, River of Glory, has been sung, not because "it's a nice thing to do" but to remind us that baptism is more than the water. For fifty days we have listened to the post-resurrection accounts of Jesus and his apostles guiding us on the path of discipleship. We have heard words such as obey, love, listen, witness, teach, peace, Holy Spirit, new heaven, new earth, shepherd, follow, feed my sheep, signs and wonders, and so on.

Guiding us through this season (and beyond) has been the Risen Jesus, or Christ, our Light. Hence the Paschal Candle has taken a prominent position near the place of proclamation, the ambo. Not to be daunted by the challenges of discipleship, we who are baptised and have received the Light of Christ, can take courage that we do not do mission on our own. After all, as Jesus promised, "*the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything and remind you of all I have said to you."* (Jn 14: 27) That same Spirit came down at Pentecost.

After today we pack away the large baptismal font in Holy Rosary, the large cross draped in white, the music to River of Glory (Yes, secretly, it will be good to pack that song away for another year!), the Alleluias in our hymns and songs (yes, there's been one, if not two songs, every Sunday since Easter) and the paschal candle is moved to its new position beside the font. The white and gold colours will soon be replaced by the green of Ordinary Time, but that's OK, because now we are filled with the Holy Spirit, we are a passionate people, renewed and refreshed by water and Word, ready to try again being disciples of Christ in a world that hungers for love.

#### Acts 2:1-11



Paul speaks of the unifying force of the Holy Spirit in the life of the community. Where do you see evidence of the Holy Spirit's power to unite believers in your faith community?


#### John 14:15-16, 23-26

### **GOSPEL REFLECTION**

"God is always more." Have you ever heard that? If we truly believe that He is infinite, then this statement is worth exploring. Today, we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit in power upon the early Church. But Pentecost wasn't the first time the disciples received the Holy Spirit. The Gospel actually occurs chronologically before Pentecost. Soon after the Resurrection, Jesus already "came and stood in their [the disciples'] midst... he breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit."

God is always more. Sometimes we might think the grace of God as one and done. God might break through in people's lives, but it's a one-time event on a retreat or preceding a dramatic conversion of life. But there's always more to come. Even today's Gospel isn't the first time the breath of God stirred. In Genesis, it's God's breath that stirs life into Adam in the garden. Jesus breathes on the Apostles, giving them the Holy Spirit in the quiet and silence. Later, that breath will stir into a "driving wind", and the Spirit will descend with flame ? not unlike Moses on Mount Sinai.

God is always more. He has spoken throughout salvation history, and continues to speak into our lives through His Church and through the Holy Spirit alive in our hearts. This Pentecost Sunday, let us come before Him with expectant hearts! Like the disciples in the Gospel and first reading, let us await what "more" God will do.
