READING "SIGNS OF THE TIMES"

For the majority of people, if not all, part of our day to day living is driving. Driving has taught me a big lesson in life, that is to stay focused on the front road, occasionally on the side and rear mirrors or rear camera screen. In other words, to keep our eyes and mind always on the road. When we take our eyes and mind away from the road, accidents most likely will happen. Sadly, it happened to me.

When we make a mission plan, it is always important to consider looking forward on what the Church would look like in the future in the long term. To me, making a realistic picture of the Church in the future and to be relevant, is to consider the past and present trends. That is why, it is important to read the "signs of the times". This reading of the "signs of the times" was made popular by Pope John XXIII.

Patrick from Catholic Mission, who gave a seminar to all priests and the Bishop of Rockhampton last 9-10 October 2019 about Cultural and Interpersonal Competency for Mission, said that Australia including Rockhampton diocese are becoming multicultural. He further said that "In the National Church Context" according to 2016 Census, "Catholics make up 22.6 % of the Australian national population, approximately 1/5 of the Australian population."

"The national average of Catholics born overseas is 26.4 %, more than 1 in 4."

"The most recent Catholic arrivals, i.e. 2013-2016, have come from Brazil, Columbia, Iraq, Middle East, North Africa and the Philippines. 19.1% of all Catholics are born in non-English speaking countries, and 20.8% or 1 in 5 currently speak a language other than English at home. It is estimated that there are between 500-550 international priests in parish ministry, with one in every two seminarians born or recruited overseas."

In the Bundaberg context, from 77,159 people in 2011 Census it's up to 79,606 in 2016 Census. Catholics are down to 18.7 % in 2016 from 19.6% in 2011. In the meantime, those who declare "No Religion" are up to 26.1 % in 2016 from 20 % in 2011.

In the socio-economic, political and religious context, my Superior General Paulus Budi Kleden and the Leadership Team pointed out that, "Signs of the times is shown in..... economic slowdown in most countries, political populism, narrow nationalism and international migration of people.... secularism is on the increase, religion is pushed back to the private realm, material values, and religious fundamentalism is increasing.... but along with these negative trends, there are positive aspects too. People are generous, faith-based communities who do not show fear, the freedom of individuals is cherished, and there is a steady growth of opportunities from the technological and digital world. But one has to see what happens to the people at the margins, vulnerable people, children and women."

Dr John Barletta, Counseling and Clinical Psychologist who gave us priests and our bishop an On-going Formation 8th October 2019 said that, "The way some people live or manage uncomfortable feelings has changed this century, with an increasing use of smartphones, gaming, pornography, coffee, alcohol, social media, and shopping, as well as being crazy busy."

"This has resulted in a new wave of problematic, compulsive, and addicted behaviours."

"To make matters more challenging, there is a generation entering adulthood who have grown up using these methods as their primary emotional coping mechanism."

"Whilst avoidance strategies have short-term benefits, the long term consequences include self-management difficulties, depression, anxiety, loneliness, and addiction."

Being aware of several "signs of the times", what are the new paths that we as a Church could tread to continue our pastoral activities? Should we draw a picture of multi-cultural Church or cross-cultural Church? Do we embrace and make enough effort towards intercultural living?

Finally, in the words of Patrick, "Intercultural living is Godly living. It is faith-based living and 'of God'. It becomes a reality when we believe that community can be sustained through our differences. There is no need to destroy differences. We cannot remove differences, but we can remove discrimination. Intercultural living is the ultimate way of inclusion". After all, "The common ground is the dignity of the person and love."

Hope would have us recognize that there is always a way out, that we can always redirect our steps, that we can always do something to solve our problems. Still, we can see signs that things are now reaching a breaking point, due to the rapid pace of change and degradation. These are evident in large-scale natural disasters as well as social and even financial crises, for the world's problems cannot be analysed or explained in isolation. Paul asks the Thessalonians to pray for him, Silvanus, and Timothy to be delivered from people who would do them harm. What would you like your faith community to pray about for you?


Luke 20:27-38

GOSPEL REFLECTION

"Some Sadducees, those who deny that there is a resurrection, came forward and put this question to Jesus..." In this Sunday's Gospel, the Sadducees avoid their real question. Is there a resurrection from the dead or not? Rather than ask this question point blank, the Sadducees try to prove their point through a roundabout, unrealistic scenario. Jesus cuts straight to the question behind the question, citing Scripture passages relating to the resurrection.

The Sadducees are trying to trick Jesus. While we may not intend to stump God, our doubts and questions may have more in common with the Sadducees than we care to admit. Doubts are part and parcel of life in a fallen world. Still, there are different ways we can word our doubts to ourselves, God, and others. When we're struggling, truly struggling, about some article of faith, do we admit it? Or do we cloak it with other, obtuse questions to hide the nature of our concern?

Have you considered leaving the Church over the hypocrisy of some of her members and leaders? Perhaps the real question is, "How can a place blessed by God and instituted by Christ have this evil in it? Can I reconcile with the concept that an institution has an admixture of good and bad? What do I expect from others, from myself? What responsibility do I have to try and remedy evil in an institution I'm part of?" Perhaps you've wondered about the nature of romantic love, and if God is love, does He really care so much about the details of this particular scenario? Perhaps the real question is, "Can my mind wrap around the concept of a God whose law seems on the surface, in this situation, to make people unhappy? What is the relationship between the moral law and human flourishing?" These aren't easy questions, but they are more honest ones. This week, don't be afraid of your deeper questions! Bring them to God, to someone you trust, and to yourself.
