The PRESENTATION of the LORD

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2 February 2020

FOCUS by Mark Fox

Richard Leonard SJ, offers this reflection on today's reading.

The word *presentation* is used in two revealing ways these days. In psychology they talk about a "presenting problem." In medicine, people are said to "present" with certain symptoms. In both cases, the word *presentation* is used to indicate that something more important lies beneath what is first observed. Further investigation reveals the deeper causes and the best course of action.

So to us. We present ourselves in the Temple knowing that God is intimately familiar with us. It is crazy that we should be anything but ourselves before Him. But we sometimes go through the pretence of dressing things up, pretending otherwise or putting on a show.

Today's feast reminds us that when we encounter the presence of God, a range of responses are on display. Just recall the ones in today's Gospel, expectation, hope, frailty, thanksgiving, foreboding, puzzlement, love and joy.

Jesus' presentation enables us to let pass in peace any need to act before God, but rather embrace a new way of encountering God's presence, where we own just how we are, and not how we would like to be. When we do this, we discover the possibilities of a rich, deep and realistic relationship with God. We also find then that it's so much easier to discover with God, the causes and actions that will lead us to healing, fulfilment and peace.

This was brought home for me during a recent retreat with Fr John, when staff were invited to look at their reflection in a mirror, and share what they saw. Among these beautiful people, each saw faults – age spots, wrinkles and so on. Fr John was very clear about the fact that the God we believe in, loves us just as we are, and sees only our beauty and our potential. God has no interest in our faults, accepts where we are on our faith journey and offers His support to help us become the best version of ourselves that we can be.

In my position, I am privileged to know Fr John well, and I see that same quality lived in all of his interactions with everyone he meets. Fr John embraces those within and outside the local church community. He welcomes, accepts and loves people wherever and however they are.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP Healing Our Blindness

You can read 100 Everyday Stewardship reflections and go to church every Sunday, but unless you are actively growing in faith and trying to live a life of generous stewardship, you cannot see the power of such a lifestyle. Like most things, we need direct, purposeful experiences to really understand.

I worked in a stewardship parish for over 20 years, but it was only after I started treating all I have as God's, and began to actively offer all I am to Him for His glory, that I really got the message. I choose to act more generously than before, which provides me with a sense of fulfillment and joy. How I act towards my family, friends, and even people I meet daily has changed. Now I am more mindful of their presence, and I seek to give them a part of me that just might change their day and bring them a little closer to Christ. I am transforming into a disciple who seeks to use all I have been given to transform all that is around me.

It would be a shame to be blind to the important things for an entire life. Today, consider taking a path of life-changing stewardship. Give it all to God. In the midst of all you have been given, you just might find God in a profound way. You may even find the real person God created you to be.



Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, "Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel." - Lk 2:34a

GOSPEL REFLECTION

"Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you prepared in the sight of all the peoples: a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and glory for your people Israel." Very often, having more light is not something we desire as it forces us to confront something we really do not want to see. There can be comfort found in darkness. It has an eerie sense of security to it. We do not have to challenge ourselves or be challenged and can simply exist in some fabricated state of self-fabricated blissfulness. Jesus came to bring light, and it is a light that is resisted by many and hated by some. It is a light that causes us to see things as they really are and not as we would want or need them to be.

It is no wonder then that Simeon boldly and honestly proclaims to Mary, "Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be contradicted and you yourself a sword will pierce so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed." We have to take the Gospel message as it is and not just use those parts that are useful to us or more palatable. Taking Jesus at face value can and will lead to turmoil and dissention. Hearts will be pierced. Whether we like it, Jesus' proclamation of what the world God created really ought to look like has real and absolute social implications.

It has a lot to say about how we treat our brothers and sisters: spiritually, personally, economically, and globally. It has everything to do with the poor, the immigrant, the scared, the unborn, the vulnerable, the sick, and the broken. The light opens us to a challenging, table-turning experience that may not be something we want to see but shows us where we need to be.

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
