Visitation Ministry

".....I was hungry and you gave me something to eat.....I was sick, and you cared for me. I was in prison, and you visited me." Matthew 25:31-40

New Coordinator: As this is my first contribution to the FOCUS in the Parish Bulletin, I'll reflect on my previous positions held in the Parishes of Burleigh Heads & Runaway Bay on the Gold Coast over the past thirty years. I initially volunteered as a Eucharist Minister, taking Communion to nursing homes and serving on the Altar in both Parishes. I also assisted in the Sacramental programs, held the positions of Columbarium Coordinator and Finance Council Member then becoming the Chair of Finance.

My new role as Visitation Coordinator includes the assisting and supporting of the many volunteers who provide this essential service within our visitation ministry which is an important part of parish outreach. This program is a very practical, systematic method of reaching out to those members of our parish who attend infrequently due to incapacity, to those who are confined within their home, those who are hospitalized or occupants of nursing homes.

Ministry: The Parish Home Visitation Program is a welcoming ministry, a way of "opening the doors to Christ." This is accomplished one home visit at a time by parish participants (our volunteers) who are solid in faith, who are good listeners, and who are passionate to share the love of Jesus Christ and His Church. Our volunteers continue with the Parish Home Visitation Program throughout the year to maintain this valued contact with the members of the parish family.

I'm especially encouraged by the generous support that our volunteers provide within the hospitals, nursing homes and home visitations. They are remarkable individuals who fulfill their role in a totally professional manner. Nothing is beyond their caring attention, dedication and faith in providing comfort to those in need. Their continuing support will undoubtedly ensure the success of our visitation ministry. It would also be amiss of me not to thank the entire team led by Fr. Peter for their encouragement and support in this the initial stages of my employment.

Application: The essence of this ministry is to listen and respond, to share prayer and sacrament, and to make present God's love and the Church's care to those in need. When people are down and going through difficult times, we are challenged to get along side of them and provide a caring, loving, and embracing atmosphere that will lift their spirits.

That . . . is what the 'Visitation Ministry' is all about.

It is our vision that our Visitation Ministry will enable our church to properly care for its whole family, a visible sign that everyone matters and is an important member of our parish community. As for any ministry, there has to be vision, some reason why this is something worth doing. Personally I look forward to every Ministry visit because of the love and joy I see on the faces and in the eyes of those we minister to, and because of the appreciation they radiate back to us because we are there with them. This is especially visible when we give the Blessed Sacrament. "…… I was hungry and you gave me something to eat……"





GOSPEL REFLECTION

What does it mean to be salt and light? If we listen carefully to Jesus' words, we gain some direction. To be salt means to bring taste, zest, and joy to life. We are asked to liven things up a bit by allowing the joy of our faith to spill over into the lives of others. Only a sincere and deep relationship with God can freshen up humanity and set it on proper course. To be light means that our faith must translate into action so that we can be Christ for others and extend the same arm of mercy and compassion that Christ did. Our acts of piety, then, cannot be directed solely at ourselves. Prayer is never about self-benefit but must always be directed toward union with God, deepening our relationships with one another and learning how to be effective stewards of the beautiful universe God has entrusted to our care.

The Master gives us wise direction in terms of how we can best become the salt and light He desires. Listen carefully to the Beatitudes. Think about the oppression and alienation that exists in our world, the violence and prejudice, the anger and the hatred, the fear and the shame. All of these things require action. The poor need food, housing, and clothes. Hatred must be replaced by love. Retaliation and violence by forgiveness. Our thoughts and speech can become more like Christ. We can change and continue to change. Blessed John Henry Cardinal Newman said, "To live is to change and to be perfect is to have changed often."

But it doesn't end with just offering the bandages needed to heal wounds. It must go deeper. We must ask ourselves what has happened that we have found ourselves in this place with these wounds and divisions. What are their causes? Together we must address these systemic problems, politically and spiritually, and face the truth. Only then will we truly be salt and light. But then again, we may not like what the light shows us. ©LPi
