### Through the Ashes, We are Called to Follow...

For everything, there is a season...

*a time to break down, and a time to build up;*

*a time to weep, and a time to laugh;*

*a time to mourn, and a time to dance. (Eccl 2:1, 4-5)*

For our Parish of Bundaberg, especially the St Mary's Mass Community, it is indeed a time of mourning. We grieve the loss of a sacred building that connected us to our God and to each other. So many of our sacred stories and memories are connected to St Mary's Church.

Our whole community watched in shock and grief as we viewed the video of St Mary's Church burning. At the end of last weekend's Masses, another wave of deep shock and grief had us standing in unified silence as we beheld a photo of the charred tabernacle.

Such deep grief can trigger memories of other losses and we may find waves of grief washing over us in the following weeks, perhaps even overwhelming us at times. This is a common human response to tragic loss. It is also a time when we need the support of each other. We gather to tell our stories and share our grief. When we do, we find the burden of grief shared is lightened a little. Our heartfelt thanks to Fr Peter and the whole Parish Team for the brilliant way they have responded and worked hard to care for this grieving community, providing gatherings and rituals that helped us process our initial grief.

Last weekend, Fr John reminded us that suffering is part of life, that we are called to pick up our cross and follow Jesus through the suffering. To follow Him is to accept this pain and sadness as part of our human journey, and to trust that God is with us on this path. *Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.* (Mt 5:4)

Sometimes, when we've been knocked off-balance or are overwhelmed with grief, it helps to talk one-on-one. We all need the support of others in times like these. There are trained Chaplains in the Parish, Counsellors at Centacare, and Home Visitation Teams available to support you on your grief journey. **If you would like some one-on-one support, please contact the Parish Office or Centacare 1300 523 985.**

Fr Peter, Fr Terry and Fr John have all reminded us that we, the people, are the church. Through the fire, St Mary's Mass Community and the whole Parish has been tested. I can see already the enduring gold of true community emerging from the ashes, being refined through the pain of loss, comforted by God's compassionate presence in our grieving hearts, and strengthened by the Spirit of Faith, Hope and Love that endures in us, the church.

So often in life, people are concerned about the minimum requirements. What is the minimum I must do to get a certain grade? What is the minimum I need to do to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation? What exactly do I have to do to make my boss happy?

## LIVING LITURGY

This Wednesday begins the season of Lent. The ashes we received on Ash Wednesday remind us of our mortality and symbolise the spirit of penance that marks the Lenten season. By being marked with ashes, we are recognised as one who has chosen to repent and believe in the Good News. The two-fold focus of Lent is repentance and renewal of our baptismal commitment to Christ, as we journey with those who are preparing for baptism at the Easter Vigil. That is why in some churches the symbol of the ashes is placed near the baptismal font or at the entrance to churches near the small water fonts.

## RULES OF FASTING AND ABSTINENCE

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence. The law of fasting binds those who have completed their eighteenth year, until the beginning of their sixtieth year; the law of abstinence binds those who have completed their fourteenth year (CCL 97, 1251 - 52).



## GOSPEL REFLECTION

The Gospels continue to challenge us to the core. This is especially true in the way our social relationships have developed. Feeling safe and secure in the world are not things that come easily these days. Actually, we may find ourselves feeling more reservation, caution, reluctance, and fear than ever before. In a moment's notice, life can drastically change. When someone has been intentionally and violently hurt, especially someone we love, we can all too easily find ourselves very attracted to the Old Testament philosophy of "an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth." Intellectually, we know this is not what Jesus wants us to do. But on some level it just seems to make practical or even political sense. After all, why should we allow someone to get away with a heinously violent act? Yet, Jesus cannot be any clearer than He is with this! Offer no resistance to one who is evil. Turn the other cheek as well. When pressed into service, go two miles. Do not turn your back on one who wants to borrow. Love your enemies. Now, take a moment to reflect on all of this. Consider a horrible act of violence committed against someone you love. Listen. Think. Be honest. Can you do as Jesus directs?

We want to be holy, but we are more comfortable with a definition of holiness that can keep us saying our prayers and on our knees in church. We are not comfortable with a definition of holiness that has something to say about to how we react to and negotiate life. We like to keep a sharp and strong line between the secular and the sacred. In fact, we would prefer that the doors between them be kept closed. God wants us to be holy as He is holy. If God sees this one way and we see it another, then where does this leave us on our journey to God?

Our minds like the practical, worldly, and secular answers to things. They are more black and white and at first glance appear to make more sense. Holiness wells up from our souls and is beyond reason. It cannot be explained. It is something we just simply know comes as a result of deep prayer. The truly contemplative eye knows inwardly that what Jesus asks is true and then willingly does it. It may not be easy. ©LPi
