FOCUS

The Catholic school is a dynamic and complex environment. It does not just include students and staff, but also families from different cultural backgrounds and different familial arrangements. Where there is such diversity, there are also common goals.

Every person in this community basically wants 3 things for its children:

To be loved for who they are

To be provided with the skills and know-how to be successful life-long learners

To know that they are incredible creations of a God who loves them beyond their wildest imaginings.

The one essential ingredient that every successful school needs to maintain a harmonious environment is respectful relationships.

It is inevitable that where there are humans interacting closely, there will be conflict, where relationships are broken and hurt and harm have resulted. In the primary school setting, this can range from a child upset by the manner another child looked at them, to a child suffering harassment or bullying.

Traditional approaches to behaviour management have to be challenged to cope with increasing levels of family breakdown, the growing number of students suffering from anxiety and anger and the loss of automatic respect for authority.

Our approach when relationships have been broken by behaviours, is one modelled by Jesus. We call it restorative practice. This approach does not rely on punishment in an attempt to change harmful behaviours. Rather it recognizes that misconduct is a violation of people and relationships and that these violations create obligations and liabilities. Restorative practices seeks to heal and to put right, the wrongs.

When working with our students, 3 questions are asked:

What happened?

Who was affected?

How can it be made right?

These questions require them to take responsibility for their behaviours, to acknowledge the effect it has had on others, and then to <u>be</u> the answer in healing and rebuilding the relationship that has been harmed or hurt.

This approach can be summed up with one word – respect. It is respect for all – for those who are different and for those who appear to be our enemies.

Pope Francis in Evangelii Gaudium, also emphasises the need to have respect for each person as "it is at the heart of the joy of the Gospel". To live out this Gospel is to be a restorative person.

Our Catholic schools are in a unique position, to teach their students to own their wrong behaviours, and to find ways to fix the wrongs these behaviours have caused. In doing so, we are helping to create a world that knows how to work through its differences peacefully and respectfully. Surely then we are closer to "thy Kingdom come."

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

The 6 Characteristics of an Everyday Stewardship for Lent – Mindful

What is it that tempts you the most? Is it an action, a person, or a place? It is something that seems innocent enough, like a food, a drink, or an event? When you really start reflecting, you find that there are many temptations all around. Even if you are strong and never succumb to a certain temptation, it is still there waiting for a weak moment in your life.

One difficultly in the life of a disciple trying to live a stewardship way of life lies in the temptations we never actually see. We are too busy thinking about past failures or successes, or we are fixated on what possibilities the future holds that we miss the important things going on in the present. Jesus could be standing directly in front of us, but we miss Him because we are looking everywhere except straight ahead.

Being mindful means that we are looking out for how and when God will call us this very day. Our decisions this day will have a huge impact on the future. If we only look to the future, we will miss those important calls to action. We may even find ourselves in a desert of sorts, looking for any way out we can find. However, God may need us to give of ourselves for a reason we cannot yet discern while in that desert. We need to stay awake, be aware, and look for His hand in all things. If we don't, we may even miss the pathway out of that desert when it presents itself- Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS

LIVING LITURGY

THE RITE OF ELECTION OR ENROLMENT OF NAMES for the catechumens, those preparing for the Easter sacraments, is always celebrated on the 1st Sunday of Lent, usually in the cathedral with the bishop. We celebrate this ritual because "The Church makes its "election," that is, the choice and admission of those catechumens who have the dispositions that make them fit to take part, at the next major celebration, in the sacraments of initiation." (RCIA 119) This choice is made by the Church (headed locally by the bishop) as an outward expression of the choice already made by God.

God, through the Church, is choosing those who are "fit" or "able" or "qualified" to be disciples of Jesus. They go to the Cathedral not to meet the bishop, or see how many parishes make up the diocese, or even to choose for themselves to take the final steps to become Catholic. Those chosen are expected to be initiated into a life in Christ, which necessarily means a life of mission. God chooses people who are fit enough to take on the rigors of missionary discipleship.

Our candidates for initiation are **Adibah Rajali** and **Noah Picaro**.

RULES OF FASTING AND ABSTINENCE

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence. The law of fasting binds those who have completed their eighteenth year, until the beginning of their sixtieth year; the law of abstinence binds those who have completed their fourteenth year (CCL 97, 1251 - 52).



Jesus resisted the devil's temptations by remaining focused on his fidelity to the Father. What temptations are you willing to confront during the season of Lent?



GOSPEL REFLECTION

Life can easily spin us out of control. While there are so many wonderful opportunities before us, we can also get easily distracted and exhausted. There is always something to do, respond to, or check. The clutter of our lives can take us off course, and the best remedy for getting back on track is the experience of the desert. Here we can face our demons square on, resist them, and get back on course. We desperately need the season of Lent. This simple time of year forces us into greater awareness and grounds us in what is good and true.

What weighs you down and keeps you trapped? Maybe you are trying to do too much and please too many people. It could be that your fragile self-image is always pushing you to prove yourself and find success. Anxiety and worry, ultimately due to a lack of faith, can quickly tempt you with despair. It could be that you are listening to too many voices and allowing all of the negativity that is present erode the genuine goodness in your heart and in all of God's creation. Or maybe you struggle too much with fear. Perhaps so much so that you are far too preoccupied with your own agenda and goals and left with little psychological or spiritual room to consider and respond to the plight of your neighbour. Do anger, bitterness, stubbornness, and hatred have homes in your heart? How about greed, gluttony, pride, apathy, or lust?

For many, their passions and what can be found on the internet are their downfall, and they are robbed of their inner life and freedom. What is it, specifically, that tempts you away from a childlike trust in God? Define this and use the next few weeks to allow God to chart you a course away from them.
