FOCUS by Kaye Beston Principal, St Joseph's Catholic Primary School

The world has changed for everyone! It can be unsettling. Recently I became aware of the term liminal space. It is from the Latin word 'limen' meaning threshold. A liminal space is the time between the 'what was' and the 'next'. "This global pandemic we now face is an example of an immense, collective liminal space." (Richard Rohr OFM Meditation 2020)

I began to think of this space in the context of education, in particular schools, in which we have new anchor points. Sustaining connectedness and relationships in this new, current Learning from Home environment presents challenges. However, in this unknown space, life and learning continue to happen.

Schools are relational environments, made up of people - staff, students and families. Certainly, buildings and resources are important and add value, but it is the people who together develop the culture of a welcoming, authentic, learning community. In this current environment, school/college communities are drawing on each other, supporting each other, learning together.

Teachers are accessing resources and new ways of teaching that perhaps they have not previously accessed or imagined. As teachers, we have been called on to learn new ways of communicating and keeping in touch with our students and families. We are open to new modes of learning and to be being vulnerable and unsure as we juggle two quite different learning settings.

The setting may change but the fundamentals of good learning and teaching remain the same. We embrace the use of technologies to reimagine how students can be engaged in quality learning. We understand and value what it means to be a learner online. Perhaps the most exciting use of technology for our current situation is the increasing power of social media to enhance learning.

Not one of us has a reliable crystal ball. We don't know what lies ahead.

As educators, we are using this current crisis as an opportunity to learn about learning from afar. We are sharing stories of our successes as teachers and we are in awe of the amazing selfless engagement of our families in their child's learning. We are developing a collective efficacy and using this experience to learn how to best work with all students.

There is an imperative for us, I believe, as teachers in Catholic Schools, to provide opportunities for authentic engagement in prayer and meditation during this period of uncertainty.

The very vulnerability and openness of liminal space allows room for something genuinely new to happen to ourselves and to our community if we can provide these contemplation opportunities and sacred spaces and times.

Perhaps in embracing this 'in between' space, across our particular circumstances, we can choose hope and be open to new, exciting, unimagined possibilities. While this period can be and has been difficult, devastating, sorrowful and challenging for many, it may also be extremely rewarding, providing opportunities for gratitude, kindness, change and growth.

Happy Mother's Day to all mothers, grandmothers, aunts, sisters, teachers and friends. Through the love, care and protection they show for us, mothers help us to understand more of what God is like.


