The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin

This feast originated in Jerusalem before the fifth century as the "Falling-Asleep of the Mother of God." It was adopted in Rome in the mid-seventh century and was renamed the "Assumption" in the eighth century. This solemnity celebrates Mary's passing over, body and soul, from this world into the glory of her risen Son.

Look at the incredible grace, love and fruitfulness that is produced from saying "YES" to what God wants to achieve through us in the world. Mary is an ideal example of someone who cooperated with God's plans and allowed God to do great things through her life and actions.

Let us never say: "What good is what I have to give, compared with the enormity of the needs, the challenges and the demands of this world? "Rather, let us imitate Mary, and say... "Yes, Lord! You are great and good. I believe you can achieve all things!"

THE PLENARY COUNCIL

Called by Christ, Sent Forth as Missionary Disciples Part 3

There is an increasing struggle in our society for the sense of identity and purpose. In a world that has become consumer driven many are caught in being individualistic with demands for self-gratification and self-importance. Many are slaves to clicking on the devices what *I like* rather than responding to the invitation of surrendering to what is true, beautiful and good. Short-term happiness on our individualised screens is prioritised over the deep satisfaction, contentment and joy that comes from knowing and living in relationship with Christ and one another.

Christ calls each of us by name to go out and bring in God's Kingdom by 'Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven'. We are called together as a community of disciples, as a Church, privileged to share in Jesus' mission. The Love of God, revealed in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ overflowing into the work and beauty of creation. Take the time to pray and reflect on our parish mission statement found in the weekly bulletin. As post-resurrection people we have the privilege and responsibility to live our part in the unfolding love story of creation.

The Plenary Council focused on the importance of **Shaping Communities on Christ and Sent by the Spirit.** Our Baptismal call is to be missionary disciples to follow Christ with joy, anointed with the oil of gladness. We are 'Good News' people who reach out to all in humility, dignity, respect and compassion.

We reflected on the many groups of people who have been marginalised including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, women, those who are divorced, those who identify as LGBTIQA+, and those who have suffered abuse of any form. We reflected on the importance of language and formation. Our Catholic Social Teachings, resources and expertise have a significant and important place in the public square. We need to commit ourselves to building friendly and cooperative relationships with other Christians, communities of other religious traditions and people of no religion. In *Evangelii Gaudium* n. 28 Pope Francis describes four key characteristics of an evangelising parish:

It is in "contact with the homes and the lives of its people."

It is "an environment for hearing God's word, for growth in the Christian life, for dialogue, proclamation, charitable outreach, worship and celebration." It "encourages and trains its members to be evangelisers"

It is "a community of communities, a sanctuary where the thirsty come to drink in the midst of their journey, and a centre of constant missionary outreach."

ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

h, Hope & Love

An inward transformation occurs in a person who decides to follow Jesus Christ. Things change. They see the world differently, understand their journey more deeply and profoundly, have their sights fixed on eternity and union with God and hold themselves to higher standards and virtues. It requires a conscious choice to be a Christian, and this choice must be renewed at least daily. While the basic premise of Jesus' message may appear heartwarming and straightforward: love of God, neighbor, and self, the implications of doing so are challenging. The true disciple is called to live radically, and often finds themselves at odds with the world or even with those in their own homes.

Holding ourselves to higher standards comes with a price. We have to leave other things behind. It is difficult to be people of faith, hope, and love in a world often fixated with its own fulfillment and self-absorption. Justice, temperance, prudence, and fortitude require sacrifice if they are to be lived with integrity. God's ways are not ours. This becomes crystal clear to those who have enough courage to stand against the tide. Putting love into action requires that we challenge accepted modes of doing business and fight complacency. This is what makes the saints stand out as witnesses. They are simply sinners, just like us, who persevere.

People do not want to be told that they're sailing their ships in the wrong direction. Clinging to their insistence and need to be correct, they can become defensive when challenged. This can happen even with those closest to us. As much as the Gospel calls us to unity, it also can easily create division. When we love seriously, we encounter more than feelings of warmth and acceptance. "What does love look like? It has the hands to help others. It has the feet to hasten to the poor and needy. It has eyes to see misery and want. It has the ears to hear the sighs and sorrows of men. That is what love looks like (St. Augustine)." Love also has the courage and honesty to tell people what they may not want to hear but need to, and model, without wavering, a life of humble, loving, and faithful service. Don't lose heart! There are many examples of faith before us and around us. If Jesus endured the voices of opposition, so too can we. There is no need to apologize for speaking the truth. ©LPi
